EXTRACT B: from The Charing Cross Mystery by J. S. Fletcher

Hetherwick had dined that evening with friends who lived in Cadogan Gardens, and had stayed so late in conversation with his host that midnight had come before he left and set out for his bachelor chambers in the Temple; it was, indeed, by the fraction of a second that he caught the last eastbound train at Sloane Square. The train was almost destitute of passengers; the car which he himself entered, a first-class compartment, was otherwise empty; no one came into it when the train reached Victoria. But at St. James's Park two men got in, and seated themselves opposite to Hetherwick.

Now Hetherwick was a young barrister, going in for criminal practice, in whom the observant faculty was deeply implanted; it was natural to him to watch and to speculate on anything he saw. Because of this, and perhaps because he had just then nothing else to think about, he sat observing the newcomers; he found interest, amusement, and not a little profit in this sort of thing, and in trying to decide whether a given man was this, that, or something else.

Of the two men thus under inspection, the elder was a big, burly, fresh-coloured man of apparently sixty to sixty-five years of age. His closely cropped silvery hair, his smartly trained grey moustache, his keen blue eyes and generally alert and vivacious appearance, made Hetherwick think that he was or had been in some way or other connected with the army; this

impression was heightened by an erect carriage, square-set shoulders and something that suggested a long and close acquaintance with the methods of the drill-yard and the parade ground. Perhaps, thought Hetherwick, he was a retired noncommissioned officer, a regimental sergeant-major, or something of that sort; this idea, again, was strengthened by the fact that the man carried a handsome walking-cane, the head of which, either of gold or of silver-gilt, was fashioned like a crown. There was something military, too, about the cut of his clothes; he was a smartly dressed man, from his silk hat, new and glossy and worn a little rakishly on the right side of his head, to his highly polished boots. A well-preserved, cheery-looking, good-humoured sort of person, this, decided Hetherwick, and apparently well satisfied with himself and full of the enjoyment of life, and likely, from all outward sight, to make old bones.

Tiësto has received nominations Grammy and is а platinum-certified record holder as a result of his distinctive approach to electronic dance music. He is the founder of the music label 'Black Hole Recordings,' which has produced some incredible tracks and albums for music fans. 'Magik,' 'In Search of Sunrise,' 'Silence,' 'In My Memory,' 'Elements of Life,' 'Kaleidoscope,' and 'Just Be' are some of Tiësto's best successes. The majority of his compositions have landed in the top 30 of Billboard's Top Electronic Albums. Tiësto received a Grammy award for his superb mixing of John Legend's song "All of Me." He is also a philanthropist, having participated in several humanitarian projects to generate cash for worthy causes. Tiësto is currently one of the world's wealthiest DJs.
- Alan Walker is a Norwegian-British DJ and music producer. He became a household name after releasing the song "Faded." The song was praised by music fans worldwide, and it was certified platinum in more than 10 countries. Walker developed an early interest in computer programming and visual design. He was fascinated by composing music after listening to composers like David Whistle and Hans Zimmer. Walker has no professional training in music composition. The 'YouTube' tutorials were important in teaching him how to compose Walker penned music. several additional songs after the of 'Faded,' popularity including 'Spectre,' 'Alone,' and 'Sing Me to Sleep. Alan Walker began his career as a music producer in the most basic of circumstances. He began producing music on his laptop with 'FL Studio.' He performs on stages live. Walker is also well-known for his distinct sense of style. Walker appears in his gigs dressed in a sweatshirt and a mask that covers half of his face. He uses media social sites such as "Instagram," "Facebook," and "Twitter."

- Marshmello is the stage name of an American dance music producer and DJ whose true identity remains unknown. To conceal his face, he puts a bucket-shaped Marshmallow helmet on his head. In 2015, he made his debut in the electronic music scene. In 2017. enough evidence arose on social media to identify him as American DJ Chris Comstock, however, Marshmello has not publicly acknowledged or disputed that he is Comstock. In November 2017, Forbes magazine published an article claiming Chris Comstock to Marshmello based on an old interview another DJ, royalty earnings records, and the common manager for Marshmello and Chris Comstock, but there was no official confirmation from Marshmello's management or lawyer. Despite the mystery surrounding his identity, Marshmello is one of the world's most popular and recognized DJs. According to others, his anonymity lends an air of mystery to his image, which aids in his appeal. He has been productive, producing a large body of work in a short period of time.
- Kyrre Gorvell-Dahll is a Norwegian producer, musician, record composer better known by his stage name, Kygo. He came to international attention with his remix of the song 'I See Fire' by Ed Sheeran. It has received more than 55 million plays on SoundCloud and over 65 million views on YouTube. Born in Singapore, he started taking piano lessons from the age of six. As a young man, he aspired to pursue a career in business and finance and began studying the subjects at university. However, he soon realized that music was his true calling. He released his first single 'Epsilon' in 2013. The next year, he released his single 'Firestone' which became a huge success. He released his first album 'Cloud Nine' in 2016. It entered various charts worldwide and stood at the 11th position on the US Billboard 200. Throughout his career, he has received several awards and nominations, such as the 'YouTube Music Video Music Award', the 'MTV Europe Music Award', the Spellemannprisen' and the 'International Dance Music Award'.
