This sterile calm was shattered by the arrival of the avant-garde artist, his clothes a kaleidoscope of clashing patterns and colours, the scent of turpentine and oil paint preceding him like a pungent herald.'"

3. "Show character development through sensory changes: 'Once, the smell of alcohol had been Jack's comfort. Now, three years sober, the mere whiff of whiskey turned his stomach, while the aroma of fresh coffee had become his new anchor to reality.'"

****3. Building Immersive Settings Through Sensory Details****

****Approaches:****

- Using sensory details to distinguish different locations
- Creating atmosphere through carefully chosen sensory elements
- Showing the passage of time through changing sensory descriptions

****Exemplars:****

1. "Distinguish locations with rich sensory details: 'The New York subway assaulted the senses – the screech of trains, the stale air thick with the scent of humanity, the grimy tiles a patchwork of faded colours. In stark contrast, Central Park offered a reprieve – the earthy smell of grass and trees, the cheerful chirping of birds, and a vibrant palette of greens soothing to the eye.'"
2. "Create atmosphere through sensory elements: 'The abandoned house reeked of decay, the musty odour of rotting wood mingling with the metallic tang of rusted pipes. Motes of dust danced in the weak sunlight filtering through grimy windows, and every step on the warped floorboards elicited an ominous creak that seemed to echo in the oppressive silence.'"
3. "Show time passing through sensory changes: 'As summer faded into autumn, the vibrant green of the forest deepened to a rich tapestry of reds and golds. The air lost its heavy, humid quality, taking on a crisp edge that carried the scent of wood smoke and ripening apples. The once-raucous birdsong gave way to the melancholy honking of geese heading south.'"

She could almost smell the rich aroma of the beef stew, could almost hear her mother's warm laughter echoing in the kitchen. The faded handwriting, the smudges of long-ago spills on the worn card – each sensory detail was a bittersweet connection to what she had lost.'"

****5. Balancing Sensory Information: Avoiding Overwhelm****

But as he held his daughter's small hand at the funeral, the world suddenly snapped into sharp focus – the vivid red of her hair ribbon a startling contrast to the sombre blacks and greys, her quiet sniffles deafening in the hushed atmosphere.'"

3. "Use sensory details economically: Rather than constant description, save rich sensory language for key moments: 'The courtroom faded into a beige blur as Emma waited to testify. But when she finally took the stand, everything sharpened – the scratch of her wool skirt against the wooden chair, the piercing gaze of the defendant, the oppressive silence broken only by the rhythmic tapping of the stenographer's keys.'"
