## a. Strengths:

- Vivid imagery of Zoe's appearance
- Intriguing concept of an "external theatre where anything could happen"
- b. Weaknesses: Inconsistent tone Your writing shifts abruptly from a supernatural horror tone to a more mundane setting. The phrase "materialised onto the stage" suggests a ghostly presence, but then you describe her watching actors in a theatre, which feels disconnected from the initial supernatural setup.
- c. Exemplar: "16-year-old Zoe Chen stepped onto the dimly lit stage, her pallid skin and blank stare giving her an otherworldly presence as she observed the actors enacting the American dream in the mysterious external theatre."
- #2: "Soon she realised thought the play that the American dream wasn't what the government had promised. So Zoe changed the script. No one liked the American dream anymore. At least not in the theatre. They all scolded and admonished at the people that played as the government."

## a. Strengths:

- Interesting concept of Zoe's ability to change reality through writing
- Exploration of disillusionment with the American dream
- b. Weaknesses: Underdeveloped plot progression Your writing jumps too quickly from Zoe's realisation to the complete change in the audience's perception. The phrase "So Zoe changed the script" lacks detail about how this change occurs or its immediate effects, leaving the reader confused about the process.
- c. Exemplar: "As the play unfolded, Zoe's disillusionment grew. With each word she scrawled on her parchment, the actors' lines shifted subtly, revealing the hollow promises behind the American dream. The audience's mood soured, their scorn directed at those portraying government figures."

#3: "Eventually half of America was going trotting up in front of the government building with the old fashioned pitchforks and torches, ready to burn it down. Everyone was rebelling, including some of the government people that didn't like the idea in the first place."

## a. Strengths:

- Dramatic escalation of events
- Inclusion of internal government dissent

b. Weaknesses: Overexaggeration and lack of realism Your writing takes an extreme leap from localised theatre dissent to nationwide rebellion without adequate build-up. The phrase "half of America was going trotting up" with "pitchforks and torches" feels anachronistic and unrealistic, detracting from the story's credibility.

c. Exemplar: "The discontent spread beyond the theatre walls, sparking protests across the country. Citizens, joined by disillusioned government officials, gathered in front of government buildings, their anger palpable as they demanded change."

Actionable task: Rewrite the opening paragraph, focusing on establishing a consistent tone and clearly defining Zoe's supernatural abilities. Ensure you gradually build up the tension and changes in the story, rather than making abrupt leaps in the plot.
