#1 (Opening paragraph): a. Strengths:

- Engaging opening that introduces the protagonist and sets the scene.

#2 (Mutiny scene): a. Strengths:

- Creates tension and conflict in the story.
- Uses dialogue to reveal the mutineers' plans.
- b. Weaknesses: Underdeveloped characterisation The mutineers' motivations and personalities are not fully explored. Their dialogue feels somewhat clichéd and lacks depth. For example, when the Cook says "And I'll set fire to the oil!", it comes across as cartoonish rather than menacing.
- c. Exemplar: "The Cook's eyes glinted with a mixture of greed and desperation as he whispered, 'And I'll ensure the flames spread quickly, leaving no trace of our deeds."

#3 (Encounter with Brenden Howth): a. Strengths:

- Introduces a supernatural element, adding intrigue to the story.
- Provides a moral lesson about the value of the journey over material gain.
- b. Weaknesses: Rushed resolution The encounter with Brenden Howth and the subsequent decision to leave the treasure feel abrupt and underdeveloped. Your writing could benefit from more exploration of the characters' thoughts and emotions during this pivotal moment. For instance, when you write "Ferdinand and I looked at each other, speechless", you could delve deeper into their internal struggles.
- c. Exemplar: "As Brenden's words echoed in the eerie silence, Ferdinand and I exchanged a look of mutual understanding, the weight of our journey and the true meaning of treasure dawning upon us."
