#1 (Opening paragraph): a. Strengths:

- b. Weaknesses: Rushed conclusion Your conclusion attempts to tie together several complex ideas very quickly, which can leave the reader feeling overwhelmed. The sudden realisation that "the American Dream was a fraud" feels abrupt and underdeveloped.
- c. Exemplar: "As the realisation spread, people began to question their understanding of success. Perhaps it wasn't about a predefined path, but about pursuing one's own desires, however simple they might be."

Actionable task: Rewrite the middle section (#2) focusing on creating clearer transitions between the theatre scene and the broader reflections on the American Dream. Ensure each shift in perspective or setting is clearly signposted for the reader.
