

#1: (First paragraph) a. Strengths:

- Engaging opening with a thought-provoking question
- Clear thesis statement at the end

#3: (Final paragraph) a. Strengths:

- Strong concluding statement
- Reiterates the main argument effectively

b. Weaknesses: Lack of specific solutions Your conclusion restates the problem but doesn't offer concrete suggestions for addressing it. For instance, you mention "achieving this checkpoint" without clarifying what specific actions could be taken.

c. Exemplar: "To protect children's privacy rights, we must advocate for clearer guidelines on social media sharing, educate parents about digital footprints, and empower children to have a say in what is shared about them online."

Actionable task: Revise your essay focusing on creating smoother transitions between ideas. Ensure each paragraph has a clear topic sentence that links to your main argument about children's privacy rights.
