### #1 - Opening paragraph Strengths:

- Strong visual imagery with "skateboard clattered" and "glossy billboard"
- Effective establishment of conflict through Zack's emotional reaction

Weaknesses: Show vs Tell  $\rightarrow$  Your writing shifts abruptly from showing to telling, particularly after the initial scene-setting. The phrase "this walk was a major form of entertainment for him" tells rather than illustrates Zack's connection to the area.

Exemplar: "Zack had traced these familiar paths since childhood, each crack in the pavement a memory, each vendor's smile a piece of home."

### #2 - Character introductions Strengths:

- Clear distinct traits for each character
- Efficient introduction of support characters

Weaknesses: Character Development  $\rightarrow$  Your character introductions feel mechanical with phrases like "Charlie, the mathematics whizz, who could solve any problem." The descriptions read like character sheets rather than organic revelations.

Exemplar: "Charlie's eyes lit up at the mention of statistics, already calculating ways to prove their point through numbers."

# #3 - Project execution Strengths:

- Clear progression of events
- Good use of idioms ("burn a candle at both ends")

Weaknesses: Pacing Issues → Your narrative rushes through the project execution with minimal detail or tension. Phrases like "Instantly, Charlie started to research" skip opportunities for showing character dynamics and building suspense.

Exemplar: "Charlie hunched over his laptop, muttering statistics under his breath whilst Nate paced the room, his environmental impact notes scattered across the floor."

Actionable Task: Rewrite the project execution scene (from "Everyone, let's start" to "stumbled back to their houses") focusing on showing the characters' personalities through their actions and interactions rather than stating what they're doing.

Overall Score: 42/50
