a. Strengths:

For instance, you jump from smacking the clock to packing for school without any transition. This rapid succession of events can feel disjointed and prevent readers from connecting with your character.

c. Exemplar: "RING! RING! My alarm clock buzzes, jolting me awake. I groan, reluctantly dragging myself out of bed and silencing the irritating noise with a well-aimed pillow toss."

a. Strengths:

- Good use of foreshadowing
- Effective build-up of tension

b. Weaknesses: Main issue: Lack of detail Your writing doesn't provide enough context about the "forbidden forest" or your character's fear. This lack of detail makes it difficult for readers to understand the significance of the situation. For example, you mention "I knew my friends would push me into that forest to overcome my fear", but you don't explain why they would do this or what exactly you're afraid of.

c. Exemplar: "When the words "forbidden forest" left her mouth, my stomach dropped. Images of towering trees and eerie shadows flashed through my mind, reminding me of the nightmares that had plagued me since childhood."

#3: "What happened after that, you may ask. I'll give you three words: CLEAN. TOILET. LUNCH. a. Strengths:

- Effective use of humour
- Strong concluding message

b. Weaknesses: Main issue: Abrupt ending Your conclusion feels rushed and doesn't provide a satisfying resolution to the story. The jump from the forest adventure to the punishment lacks detail and leaves readers wanting more. For instance, you don't explain how you were caught or what exactly happened in the office, which are crucial parts of the story.

c. Exemplar: "As we scrubbed the grimy toilets, the putrid smell a constant reminder of our ill-fated adventure, I couldn't help but think that facing a ghost might have been preferable to this punishment."

Actionable task: Rewrite the opening paragraph, focusing on slowing down the pacing. Include more sensory details and emotions to help readers connect with your character's morning routine.
