For example, you state, "Scientists have hope that if more car brands use electric, we might just be solving 75% of global warming!" This claim needs more substantiation and a clearer link to self-driving technology.

#3 (Conclusion):

a. Strengths:

- Concise restatement of main points
- Clear personal stance

b. Weaknesses: Lack of impact Your conclusion, while summarising the main points, doesn't leave a lasting impression on the reader. It simply restates the arguments without providing a compelling final thought or call to action. For instance, you conclude with, "I strongly believe that we should have self-driving electronic vehicles." This doesn't inspire further thought or action from your audience.

c. Exemplar: "As we stand on the cusp of a transportation revolution, the choice is clear: embracing self-driving electronic vehicles means choosing a future with safer roads, cleaner air, and calmer commutes. It's time for us to take the wheel and steer our society towards this brighter, more sustainable future."
