# #1 Opening Paragraph Strengths:

- Strong visual imagery with "skateboard clattered" and vivid description of the billboard
- Effective establishment of conflict through Zack's emotional reaction

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped Setting Context —> Your opening would benefit from grounding readers more firmly in the Venice Beach setting before introducing the conflict. The phrase "he called home" could be expanded to paint a richer picture of why this place matters to Zack personally.

Exemplar: "Zack's skateboard clattered to the ground as he stared in disbelief at the glossy billboard. The vibrant heartbeat of Venice Beach Boardwalk - street performers, local artists, and the salty ocean breeze he'd known since childhood - would soon be replaced by 'Sunset Plaza-Luxury Shopping, Dining, and Entertainment.'"

## #2 Character Introduction Strengths:

- Clear establishment of core characters and their roles
- Natural dialogue that reveals personality

Weaknesses: Rushed Character Development —> Your introduction of Susie and Tom feels abrupt, particularly in "said Susie, tossing a fresh bottle of spray paint." We need more insight into these characters' connection to the boardwalk to understand their motivation.

Exemplar: "I'll paint awareness murals on the boardwalk,' said Susie, her fingers already stained with the colours that had made her famous among local street artists."

## #3 Resolution Strengths:

- Demonstrates youth empowerment
- Includes symbolic victory through art

Weaknesses: Unclear Conflict Resolution —> Your ending where "both men fought eyes on us, the protesters, and ran" feels too convenient. The phrase "Nobody knew why though" highlights the need for a more logical conclusion to the conflict.

Exemplar: "The businessmen faced not just protesters, but the united spirit of a community unwilling to let its cultural heritage disappear behind glass and steel."

Actionable Task: Rewrite the ending paragraph focusing on making the resolution more believable by showing specific actions or words from the protesters that convinced the developers to abandon their plans.
