Section 1:

#1: Opening paragraph Strengths:

- Strong opening hook with visual and emotional impact
- Effective sensory details with "redolent aroma of earthy shrubs"

Weaknesses: Show vs Tell \rightarrow You rely too heavily on direct statements rather than allowing scenes to unfold naturally through action and dialogue. "He had lived here his whole life" could be revealed through memory or conversation.

Exemplar: "Zack's fingers traced the peeling paint of a familiar storefront. Every crack and sunfaded poster held fifteen years of memories - memories that would soon be bulldozed for luxury shops."

#2: Character introduction paragraph Strengths:

- Clear differentiation between characters' specialties
- Efficient introduction of the support cast

Weaknesses: Character Development \rightarrow Your character introductions feel formulaic and tell rather than show their traits. The descriptions read like character sheets rather than organic revelations.

Exemplar: "Charlie was already scribbling calculations on his ever-present notepad, while Nate pressed a leaf between his journal pages, rattling off facts about local flora that could be endangered."

#3: Project execution paragraphs Strengths:

- Clear progression of events
- Good use of dialogue to move the story forward

Weaknesses: Pacing \rightarrow Your transitions between scenes feel rushed and mechanical. The project development lacks meaningful interaction between characters.

Exemplar: "As the sun set, Zack rubbed his tired eyes. 'We've been at this for hours,' he said, watching Charlie slouch over his third cup of coffee. 'Let's wrap up and tackle the rest tomorrow.'"

Actionable Task: Rewrite the character introduction scene by showing each friend's specialty through their actions and dialogue rather than listing their traits.
