#1 (Opening paragraph): Strengths:

- Strong visual imagery through sensory details like "clattered" and "colorful Venice Beach"
- Effective establishment of conflict and emotional stakes

The dialogue like "Let's throw a rally!" lacks the depth of a long-standing friendship facing a crisis. Exemplar: "Maya's fingers drummed against her skateboard as she spoke, a nervous habit Zack recognised from years of friendship. 'A rally,' she said quietly, then with growing conviction. 'We need to show them what they're really trying to destroy.""

#3 (Rally scene): Strengths:

- Vivid atmosphere through specific details
- Strong emotional resonance

Weakness: Rushed pacing —> Your rally scene moves too quickly from setup to speech, missing opportunities to build tension. Phrases like "On the day of the rally" and "when he stepped up" skip important emotional moments. Exemplar: "Zack's hands trembled as he counted the growing crowd. Fifteen minutes until his speech, and already the boardwalk thrummed with more energy than he'd ever felt – painters perched on scaffolding, musicians tuning their instruments, and hundreds of familiar faces waiting for someone to give voice to their shared fear."
