Strengths:

Strengths:

- Compelling background information that adds depth to character
- Effective use of tension in describing the birth scene

Weaknesses: Tense Inconsistency \rightarrow Your writing shifts between past and present tenses, particularly evident in "Rick has had a terrible backstory." The narrative loses impact due to these shifts.

Exemplar: "Rick's story had been marked by tragedy from the start - his mother's heart failed during his birth, and had he emerged just a second later, he wouldn't have survived."
