#3: "Think about this. What if you don't do anything and leave Earth to die? Where will the future humans live? Is this a paradox?"

## Strengths:

- Effective use of thought-provoking questions
- Creates emotional connection through future implications

Weaknesses: Argument Development  $\rightarrow$  Your questions, while engaging, need supporting details to strengthen their impact. The concept of Earth "dying" and future implications requires more specific development.

Exemplar: "Consider the devastating consequences of inaction: if we allow Earth's resources to be depleted and its ecosystems to collapse, where will future generations call home?"
