#1 (First paragraph): a. Strengths:

- c. Through recent challenges like the COVID-19 lockdowns, technology has proven essential for maintaining education, work, and social connections. This demonstrates how phones and other devices have become vital tools for human connection and progress.

■ Your persuasive piece makes good points about technology's benefits, but needs stronger evidence to support your claims. Try adding specific examples of how phones help with learning perhaps mention helpful learning apps or ways students use phones for homework. Also, your paragraphs would be more convincing if you added examples of how phones helped specific groups during lockdown, like grandparents video calling their grandchildren. Your opening could grab attention better by starting with an interesting fact about phone usage. Additionally, try making your ending stronger by clearly stating your main message about phones being helpful rather than harmful. Your writing would be more persuasive if you addressed some concerns people have about phones and explained why the benefits are more important.
