Strengths:

- Strong hook that immediately creates intrigue and mystery
- Effectively establishes the unique ability of your main character

Weakness: Tense consistency  $\rightarrow$  Your writing switches between past and present tense ("has happened" vs "noticed"). This makes the timing of events unclear for your readers.

# Exemplar: *Every midnight, the stars above the village flickered off for exactly one minute, but only Liam seemed to notice. This had happened many times throughout his life, first occurring when he was six, as an apprentice.*

#2: "He was reclusive, usually found alone, reading a scroll about the legends of ancient gods. He had always wanted the chance, the chance to prove the village wrong."

Strengths:

- Good character development showing Liam's personality
- Nice connection between his isolation and desire for validation

Weakness: Repetitive phrasing  $\rightarrow$  Your writing repeats "the chance" which makes the flow choppy. The connection between reading scrolls and proving the village wrong needs more detail.

### Exemplar: *He was reclusive, often found alone studying scrolls about ancient gods, yearning for the moment he could prove to his village that his visions were real.*

#3: "Fang walked towards him until he was only a meter away. He then said, "Trouble is coming. The stars speak of a great darkness threatening to engulf all tribes,""

Strengths:

- Creates tension through mysterious prophecy
- Introduces broader conflict beyond Liam's personal struggle

Weakness: Dialogue depth  $\rightarrow$  Your dialogue is brief and could reveal more about both characters. The prophecy feels sudden without showing Fang's emotions or Liam's reaction.

Exemplar: Fang approached slowly, his ethereal form casting starlight shadows. His voice echoed with ancient wisdom as he warned, "A great darkness gathers strength, threatening to devour all tribes. The stars themselves tremble at its approach."

■ Your story presents an interesting premise about a young warrior with a unique ability to see celestial phenomena. You could strengthen the connection between Liam's gift of seeing the flickering stars and the prophecy he receives. Consider adding more details about how his isolation has shaped his character and why he specifically was chosen to receive this vision.

Actionable task: Rewrite the prophecy scene focusing on the emotional impact of the message on Liam, including his physical reactions and thoughts about how this relates to his ability to see the flickering stars.

#1 (First paragraph about being a good student) Strengths:

- Clear explanation of empathy and its importance
- Good connection between academic and social skills

Weaknesses: Depth of discussion  $\rightarrow$  Your writing would benefit from specific examples showing how empathy helps in school settings. You mention "sitting next to someone" but could explore deeper impacts.

### Exemplar: A good student shows empathy by helping classmates who struggle with difficult subjects, or by including lonely peers during break time.

#2 (Unfair treatment response) Strengths:

- Detailed step-by-step approach to handling conflict
- Inclusion of a real-life example

Weaknesses: Structure  $\rightarrow$  Your response jumps between general approaches and the specific example. The transition between these ideas needs to be smoother.

Exemplar: For instance, last term when I saw my friend being bullied, I immediately stepped in to help. This experience taught me the importance of following proper steps: first calming everyone down, then involving a teacher, and finally working towards a solution.

#3 (Historical figure meeting) Strengths:

- Clear personal connection to mathematics
- Specific interest in a mathematical concept (pi)

Weaknesses: Development  $\rightarrow$  Your response could elaborate on why understanding pi's discovery matters to you personally.

# Exemplar: I would ask Archimedes about his discovery of pi because understanding how he calculated this infinite number without modern technology would help me appreciate the brilliance of ancient mathematics.

■ Your answers show good basic understanding but need more depth in examples and personal reflection. Try expanding your responses by adding more specific details about how these qualities and experiences have shaped you. For the Archimedes answer, you could discuss more

of his contributions that interest you. Consider adding your thoughts about how meeting him would influence your own approach to mathematics.

Section 2:

What does being a good student mean to you?

For me, there are many qualities that a good student has, but the main ones are empathy and self-control. #1 The first quality, empathy, is the ability to understand and share the feelings of other people.
