Strengths:

- Shows compassion and practical thinking by addressing immediate needs (shelter, food) and long-term solutions (employment, housing)
- Demonstrates local awareness by mentioning Cumberland specifically

Weakness: Structure of response \rightarrow Your sentence is too long and contains multiple ideas compressed together. The key points about helping the homeless get lost in this lengthy construction.

Exemplar: *I would establish a homeless shelter in Cumberland that provides essential services. This facility would offer temporary accommodation and meals while also running programmes to help residents secure employment and permanent housing.*

#2 "Unfortunately, we were so stubborn, there was no choice, but to part ways. And though sorrowful, it made us realise that we fulfilled our potential, when working together, and thus meaning that my friend and I chose the middle ground."

Strengths:

- Shows emotional maturity in acknowledging stubbornness
- Demonstrates growth through conflict resolution

Weakness: Clarity of message \rightarrow Your response jumps between parting ways and working together, making it difficult to understand the actual outcome of the situation.

Exemplar: *Initially, our stubbornness led us to separate. However, this helped us realise we worked best as a team, so we eventually compromised and found a middle ground.*

#3 "Though bizarre, I would enjoy teaching Greek mythology, due to the fact that greek mythology isn't like math, or english, when you can teach a subtopic in less than half an hour"

Strengths:

- Shows genuine interest in the subject
- Demonstrates understanding of teaching complexity

Weakness: Development of ideas \rightarrow Your response focuses more on comparing subject lengths rather than explaining your teaching approach, which was the main question.

Exemplar: I would love to teach Greek mythology because its rich stories offer valuable life lessons. I would engage students through interactive storytelling and discussions about the moral messages in these ancient tales.
