WRITING PIECE 1 - FEEDBACK

Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph) Strengths:

- Strong sensory details with the description of the map's texture and appearance
- Effective establishment of mystery through the bottle discovery

Weakness: Limited character introduction \rightarrow Your opening focuses mainly on the map but gives little insight into Chloe's personality or background. The phrase "she felt the ridges" could be expanded to show more of Chloe's traits and emotions.

Exemplar: Chloe's heart raced as she felt the ridges of the ancient map, her curiosity growing with each mysterious symbol she traced.

#2 (Third paragraph) Strengths:

- Good portrayal of internal conflict
- Natural progression of Chloe's thoughts about the island

Weakness: Rushed emotional development \rightarrow Your description of Chloe's evening shows her preoccupation but doesn't fully explore her feelings. The line "completely immersed in her own thoughts" could delve deeper into her specific worries and excitement.

Exemplar: As Chloe walked home, her mind buzzed with endless possibilities - would the island hold ancient secrets, or was she chasing an impossible dream?

#3 (Final paragraph) Strengths:

- Effective buildup of tension with the storm
- Clear resolution with meaningful consequences

Weakness: Underdeveloped conclusion \rightarrow Your ending wraps up quickly after the rescue. The phrase "never would" doesn't fully address what Chloe learned from her adventure.

Exemplar: Chloe hugged her mother tightly, finally understanding that some mysteries weren't worth risking your life for - especially when people who love you could get hurt.

■ Your story has a fascinating premise about a mysterious map and speaking storms. You've created an intriguing setup with the bottle discovery and map translation. However, you could

make Chloe's journey more meaningful by showing how this adventure changes her. Try adding more details about her feelings throughout the story. Your dialogue helps move the plot forward, but you could use it more to show the relationships between characters. Consider making the ending stronger by showing what Chloe gained from this experience beyond just learning not to be reckless.

Actionable Task: Rewrite the final paragraph focusing on Chloe's emotional growth and what she learned from this adventure. Include specific details about how she feels about her mother, Bill, and Alice after their help in rescuing her.

Section 1:

#1 "In the soft glow of the alien sunset, the crowd gasped at the intricate sculpture, unaware it was created by the one thing they feared most."

Strengths:

- Your opening line creates intrigue and mystery
- Your use of sensory details with "soft glow" sets the scene effectively

Weakness: Limited Context \rightarrow Your opening line, while captivating, leaves readers without enough background about the setting or characters. The phrase "the one thing they feared most" needs more detail to help readers understand why the aliens are feared.

Exemplar: In the soft glow of the alien sunset, the crowd gathered at the city's renowned art gallery, gasping at the intricate sculpture, unaware it was created by the beings whose arrival had terrified Earth just months ago.

#2 "Jack was extremely inquisitive about this piece of art so he strode over to one of the guards and asked who had made the sculpture."

Strengths:

- Your character shows clear motivation
- Your writing moves the plot forward naturally

Weakness: Character Development \rightarrow Your portrayal of Jack lacks emotional depth. The text tells us he is "extremely inquisitive" but doesn't show why he's so interested or what draws him to the sculpture specifically.

Exemplar: Jack's hands trembled with excitement as he approached the guard, unable to shake off the feeling that this sculpture held secrets beyond human capability.

#3 "Jack tried to run as fast as he could but the alien seemed to have inhumane speed and in moments the alien was next to him."

Strengths:

- Your writing creates tension
- Your pacing builds suspense effectively

Weakness: Scene Development \rightarrow Your chase scene moves too quickly without building enough suspense. The phrases "tried to run" and "alien was next to him" need more descriptive elements to create a more vivid picture.

Exemplar: Jack's feet pounded against the polished floor as he darted between display cases, but the alien's shadow stretched before him, its otherworldly speed closing the gap between them with each heartbeat.

■ Your story has an interesting premise about art and aliens that draws readers in. You could enhance your narrative by developing the relationship between humans and aliens more deeply. Try adding more details about why humans fear aliens, yet admire their art. Your chase scene could benefit from more emotional reactions from Jack. Consider including more dialogue between characters to reveal information naturally rather than through narrative exposition.

Actionable Task: Rewrite the chase scene (paragraph 5) focusing on Jack's emotional state and physical sensations during the pursuit. Include specific details about the gallery setting and how it affects his escape attempt.

- Good use of contrasting examples (small vs big challenges)

Weaknesses: Lack of depth in preparation strategy \rightarrow Your response could benefit from specific details about how you prepare for challenges. The phrase "come prepared" is too general and needs concrete examples of preparation methods your family taught you.

Exemplar: "My family taught me to prepare for challenges by creating step-by-step plans and gathering necessary resources, just like when my father showed me how to break down my science project into manageable tasks."

#2 "The one tradition in my family that I cherish the most is when my whole family gathers together on special occasions..."

Strengths:

- Genuine emotional connection expressed
- Clear reason for valuing the tradition

Weaknesses: Limited description of the tradition \rightarrow Your response needs more vivid details about these gatherings. The phrase "go somewhere and eat" doesn't paint a picture of these special moments.

Exemplar: "Our family gatherings are filled with laughter as we share stories over steaming dishes of our favourite foods, with my grandmother's special curry taking centre stage at every celebration."

#3 "The person in my family that inspires me the most is my grandma..."

Strengths:

- Personal connection clearly shown
- Good use of specific example with chocolate incident

Weaknesses: Surface-level life lessons \rightarrow Your response could dive deeper into how these lessons changed your behaviour. The phrase "practice makes perfect" needs real-life examples of how your grandmother demonstrated this.

Exemplar: "My grandmother showed me the value of practice through her dedication to mastering watercolour painting, spending hours perfecting each brush stroke until she could create beautiful landscapes."

■ Your responses show genuine personal reflection but need more specific details and examples to bring your experiences to life. Try to include more sensory details and specific moments that show these family influences. Your answers could be longer by adding more real-life situations that demonstrate how these family lessons have shaped you.
