## **□** WRITING PIECE 1 - FEEDBACK

#### Section 1:

#1 "She felt the ridges of the map she was carving and wondered if the storms below still whispered secrets to those who dared listen." Strengths:

- Creates an engaging opening with sensory details through touch
- Sets up mystery and intrigue with metaphorical language

Weakness: Limited world-building context  $\rightarrow$  Your opening line, while poetic, drops readers into the scene without establishing basic setting elements. The mention of "storms below" and "whispered secrets" needs more context to help readers understand the world's unique features.

Exemplar: The ancient wooden table creaked as Nora traced the ridges of her carved map, gazing down at the storm-shrouded lowlands where none had ventured since Monkastri's arrival.

#2 "When Monkastri came, Nora was shopping for clothes at the mall. As Nora was looking at discount prices and examining the clothes, she heard screams outside the mall, quickly being replaced by a roar." Strengths:

- Effectively shows contrast between normal life and sudden chaos
- Creates tension through sound progression

Weakness: Underdeveloped scene transition  $\rightarrow$  Your flashback scene shifts too abruptly. The transition from map-carving to shopping needs smoother connection. "When Monkastri came" feels rushed without emotional build-up.

Exemplar: The memory hit Nora like a physical blow - she had been examining a sale rack at the mall, just another ordinary Friday, when the first screams began.

#3 "Her choices were to either show the map to the village or to keep it to herself. Showing the village meant absolute panic and fury or bravery and a chance to defeat Monkastri and his minions for good." Strengths:

- Presents clear stakes and conflict
- Shows character's internal struggle

Weakness: Rushed decision-making → Your ending presents important choices but doesn't explore Nora's thought process deeply enough. The options feel listed rather than emotionally weighed.

Exemplar: Nora's fingers trembled over the carved map as she weighed her choices: reveal its secrets to the village and risk chaos, or keep silent and maintain their fragile peace.

■ Your story builds an interesting post-apocalyptic world with unique elements like the elevation safety limit and mysterious storms. To deepen your narrative, try focusing more on sensory details that bring the highland village to life. Show how people have adapted to living at such high elevations and what daily life looks like now. Your character Nora needs stronger motivations for making her maps - perhaps add details about personal losses or specific questions she hopes to answer about Monkastri. Consider developing the relationship between Nora and the young man to add emotional depth to their interaction.

Actionable Task: Rewrite the flashback scene focusing on Nora's emotional journey from ordinary shopper to survivor, including specific details about how she felt during each stage of Monkastri's arrival.

## Section 1:

#1 "In the soft glow of the alien sunset, the crowd gasped at the intricate sculpture, unaware it was created by the one thing they feared most." Strengths:

- Strong visual imagery with "soft glow" and "alien sunset"
- Effective hook that creates mystery and tension

Weakness: Limited Scene Setting  $\rightarrow$  Your opening presents an intriguing scene but lacks details about the environment and atmosphere. Adding sensory details about the sculpture's appearance and the crowd's reactions would help readers picture the scene better. The phrase "the one thing they feared most" needs more context early on.

Exemplar: In the soft glow of the crimson alien sunset, the crowd stood mesmerised by the towering crystal sculpture, its spiral patterns casting dancing shadows across their awestruck faces, unaware it was created by their greatest nightmare - Ragnastar.

#2 "Jimmy knew that currently, Ragnastar was in Volitar, the land where evil resides, and it was planning something big." Strengths:

- Creates suspense about the antagonist's plans
- Introduces an interesting setting with "Volitar"

Weakness: Underdeveloped World-building → Your mention of Volitar needs more details to help readers understand this world. The description "land where evil resides" is too simple. The phrase "planning something big" could be more specific about what makes Ragnastar's plan frightening.

Exemplar: Jimmy knew Ragnastar lurked in the shadows of Volitar, a realm of eternal darkness where corrupted creatures roamed freely, plotting to enslave humanity through its mind-controlling powers.

#3 "Jimmy also knew that, after the Euric Incident, he vowed to stop Ragnastar's plans." Strengths:

- Shows character motivation
- References past events that shape the story

Weakness: Unexplored Background → Your reference to the "Euric Incident" leaves readers wondering about this important event. The vow feels empty without showing Jimmy's personal connection to this incident.

Exemplar: The memories of the Euric Incident still haunted Jimmy's dreams - the day he watched helplessly as Ragnastar turned his entire village into mindless servants, driving him to make a solemn vow to end the creature's reign of terror.

■ Your story has fascinating elements of science fiction and fantasy, but needs deeper emotional connections. Try showing how Jimmy feels about losing his friend Eddy instead of just stating it. The conflict between destroying or preserving the statue could be more impactful if you show how this choice affects Jimmy personally. Add more details about why the crowd finds the sculpture beautiful despite its sinister origin. Consider developing the friendship between Jimmy and Eddy earlier in the story to make their separation more meaningful.

Actionable Task: Rewrite the scene where Jimmy confronts Eddy, focusing on their emotional reactions and including flashbacks of their shared experiences that make their friendship valuable.

## Section 2:

## Section 1:

## Strengths:

- Shows personal growth and self-reflection
- Effectively illustrates the transformation from fear to acceptance

Weaknesses: Limited depth in describing the learning process → Your response could benefit from detailing specific actions taken to improve after the test. The phrase "learned from my mistakes and improved" leaves readers wondering about concrete steps taken.

Exemplar: After scoring poorly on the maths test, I created a study schedule with my parents' guidance and practised similar problems daily, which helped me score 15% higher on the next exam.

#2: "There are many traditions in my family that I cherish... giving our grandma and all of us a healthy, long life."

# Strengths:

- Clear cultural significance explained
- Personal connection through specific example

Weaknesses: Surface-level emotional connection  $\rightarrow$  Your response focuses mainly on describing what happens rather than exploring deeper emotional significance. The phrase "we all ate noodles for lunch as a family" could expand on how this tradition strengthens family bonds.

Exemplar: Sharing noodles on my grandmother's birthday creates precious moments where we laugh, share stories, and feel truly connected as a family, making these celebrations particularly meaningful to me.

#3: "Out of all my family members, my mother... she tells us about how she gets a good job and a degree by studying hard."

#### Strengths:

- Clear choice of role model
- Includes concrete life lessons

Weaknesses: Limited exploration of impact  $\rightarrow$  Your response lists lessons learned but doesn't show how they've shaped your actions. The phrase "she tells us about how she gets a good job" needs more personal application.

Exemplar: My mother's journey inspired me to persist through challenging coursework, and when I struggled with computer programming, I remembered her words about improvement through dedication.

■ Your responses would benefit from deeper personal reflection and specific examples showing how family influences have directly impacted your choices and actions. Try to share more detailed stories that show the emotional connection to your family traditions and values. Add more details about how you've put your mother's lessons into practice in your daily life.
