Section 1:

Strengths:

- Strong opening that creates intrigue and mystery
- Effective use of descriptive details that set the scene

Weakness: Limited sensory details \rightarrow Your writing would benefit from including more sensory elements about the beach setting. The scene lacks descriptions of how the sand felt, the weather, or the sounds around Lucas.

Exemplar: On the last day of summer, as seagulls wheeled overhead and warm sand shifted beneath his feet, Lucas found a glass jar half-buried in the sand.

#2 "His bone-white nimble fingers slowly took of his ebony black hoodie, revealing a gargantuan red scar under his eyes, whispering secrets of the past yet untold."

Strengths:

- Creative use of symbolism with the scar
- Good attempt at building character backstory

Weakness: Character development gaps \rightarrow Your description of Lucas focuses heavily on physical appearance but lacks emotional depth. The scar is mentioned but its significance isn't properly connected to the story's later revelations about his mother.

Exemplar: His trembling fingers traced the old scar beneath his eyes - a reminder of the accident that had taken his mother away, as he slowly removed his black hoodie.

#3 "His stern face broke into tears. A slight smile spread across his face, a juxtaposition to his appearance. His mother had died a few years ago, and memories of her still flood in his mind."

Strengths:

Good emotional transition

• Effective use of contrasting emotions

Weakness: Emotional progression \rightarrow Your writing jumps too quickly between emotional states without fully developing each feeling. The shift from stern to tears to smiling happens too abruptly.

Exemplar: Tears welled up in his eyes as the stern mask he wore began to crack. For the first time in years, a gentle smile touched his lips as memories of his mother flooded back.

■ Your narrative has an interesting mystery element with the coded message, but the connection between the jar, code, and locket needs more development. The emotional impact would be stronger if you built up Lucas's relationship with his mother through specific memories or flashbacks. Your ending feels rushed and leaves readers wondering what Lucas realised.

Actionable Task: Rewrite the ending paragraph focusing on what Lucas specifically realises, and include at least one specific memory of his mother that makes the locket discovery meaningful.

Section 1:

Strengths:

- Strong hook that immediately creates mystery and intrigue
- Effective use of repetition with "Every midnight" to emphasise the routine

Weakness: Limited Setting Details \rightarrow Your opening establishes an interesting premise but lacks sensory details about the village and porch setting. "Above the village" and "on the porch" give only basic location information.

Exemplar: Every midnight, as the cool mountain air settled over the sleeping village, the stars above their tin-roofed homes flickered off for exactly one minute, but only Liam seemed to notice.

#2 "H-Heather", he whispered. She was there, right in front of him. Except she wasn't in human form. She was foggy mist."

Strengths:

- Effective use of dialogue to show emotion
- Creative description of Heather's ghostly appearance

Weakness: Emotional Depth \rightarrow Your description of this pivotal reunion could delve deeper into Liam's emotional state. The stuttering shows nervousness, but we need more of his internal thoughts and physical reactions.

Exemplar: "H-Heather," he whispered, his hands trembling as he reached toward the foggy mist that was once his sister, his heart pounding with both joy and fear.

#3 "'Run', she whispered. Bewilderment was written all over Liam's face."

Strengths:

- Creates immediate tension and suspense
- Shows clear contrast between characters' knowledge

Weakness: Abrupt Ending \rightarrow Your ending feels rushed and leaves too many questions unanswered. The shift from reunion to danger happens too quickly without enough build-up.

Exemplar: "Run," she whispered urgently, her misty form growing fainter as the darkness around them seemed to deepen. Liam's face twisted in confusion as the truth slowly dawned on him - the missing stars were only the beginning.

■ Your narrative shows promise in creating a supernatural atmosphere and emotional connection between siblings. However, you could strengthen the story by developing the relationship between the mysterious disappearing stars and Heather's warning. Consider adding more details about why the stars vanish and how this connects to the danger Heather senses. You might also explore how this experience changes Liam's perspective on loss and grief.

Actionable task: Rewrite the final paragraph focusing on building tension gradually, connecting the missing stars to Heather's warning, and showing Liam's emotional journey from confusion to understanding.

Section 1:

#1 "Being a good student, to me, is more than just achieving good grades..." Strengths:

- Shows maturity in understanding that being a good student involves multiple aspects
- Effectively uses personal experience as evidence

Weakness: Limited development of ideas \rightarrow You briefly mention discipline and respect but don't fully explain how these qualities make someone a good student. The example given is quite general and could be more specific about how you demonstrate discipline and maturity.

Exemplar: When I consistently complete my homework on time and help classmates understand difficult concepts, I demonstrate the discipline and maturity that make a good student.

#2 "If I see someone being treated unfairly..." Strengths:

- Provides a concrete real-life example
- Shows problem-solving skills and empathy

Weakness: Repetitive structure → Your response uses "I would" multiple times which makes it sound less natural. The solutions mentioned could be more detailed about how you actually helped resolve the conflict.

Exemplar: After noticing the tension in our group, I pulled both friends aside to understand their perspectives and helped them find common ground through open discussion.

#3 "If I could meet any historical figure..." Strengths:

- Shows genuine interest in the subject
- Demonstrates knowledge of da Vinci's work

Weakness: Underdeveloped reasoning → While you list da Vinci's achievements, you don't fully explain why meeting him would be meaningful to you personally. The gravity question seems disconnected from the earlier points about his inventions.

Exemplar: I would ask da Vinci about his creative process and how he managed to excel in so many different fields, as his multidisciplinary approach to learning continues to inspire me.

■ Your answers show good potential but need more depth and personal connection. Try to give more specific examples from your own experience rather than general statements. Make your responses longer by explaining the impact of your actions and what you learned from situations. When discussing historical figures, connect their achievements to your own interests and aspirations.

Score: 42/50

Section 2: #1 Being a good student, to me, is more than just achieving good grades, but about discipline, respect and much more.
