## Section 1:

# Strengths:

# Strengths:

- Strong build-up of mystery and tension

Weakness: Underdeveloped object significance → Your description of the jar remains surface-level. While you mention it being "precious," you don't establish why this particular find matters to Lucas beyond simple curiosity.

Exemplar: The symbols writhed on the weathered paper like ancient serpents, each mark pulsing with an otherworldly energy that both frightened and fascinated Lucas.

■ Your narrative shows promise in creating atmosphere but needs more emotional depth. The connection between Lucas and the mysterious jar could be stronger to make readers care about the discovery. Try adding more about why this moment matters to Lucas personally. You could also make the ending more impactful by showing how this discovery might change him.

Actionable task: Rewrite the scene where Lucas first spots the jar, focusing on his personal connection to the beach and why this discovery feels significant to him specifically.

#### Section 1:

# Strengths:

- Your opening immediately draws readers in with an intriguing supernatural element
- Your use of personification ("sky seemed to breathe") creates vivid imagery

Weakness: Limited context → Your introduction would benefit from establishing why Liam is the only one who notices this phenomenon. The phrase "only Liam seemed to notice" needs more depth about his character or circumstances that make him uniquely aware.

Exemplar: Every midnight, the stars above the village flickered off for exactly one minute, but only Liam, with his lifelong fascination with astronomy and countless nights spent stargazing, seemed to notice.

#2 "The air was crisp and smelled faintly of pine, as if the trees were whispering secrets just out of earshot. But none of this felt as alive to Liam as the sky did, flickering in and out like a distant memory."

# Strengths:

- Your sensory details create an atmospheric setting
- Your metaphor comparing the sky to a memory adds depth

Weakness: Disconnected imagery → Your descriptions, while lovely, don't link clearly to the plot. The phrase "none of this felt as alive" needs to connect more directly to why the sky's behaviour matters to Liam.

Exemplar: The air was crisp and smelled faintly of pine, but Liam barely noticed, his attention fixed on the sky above—the same sky that had first sparked his curiosity when his grandmother taught him about the constellations years ago.

#3 "Before Liam could react, the figure faded into the forest, and the stars blinked out again. But this time, Liam knew: he was no longer the only one watching."

## Strengths:

- Your ending creates suspense
- Your final line effectively shifts the story's dynamic

Weakness: Rushed revelation  $\rightarrow$  Your ending introduces the mysterious figure without building up to this moment. The phrase "Before Liam could react" rushes past what could be a more impactful encounter.

Exemplar: The figure's form shimmered like starlight before melting into the forest shadows, and as the stars above blinked out again, Liam felt a profound shift in his understanding: after all these years of solitary observation, he was no longer the only one watching.

■ Your narrative presents an engaging premise but needs deeper emotional connection to Liam's perspective. You could strengthen the story by weaving in his personal history with the night sky throughout the piece. Consider adding more details about why this phenomenon matters so much to him specifically. Try building tension more gradually towards the mysterious encounter.

Actionable task: Rewrite the scene where Liam first steps outside, focusing on including specific memories or experiences that explain his unique connection to the stars.

#1 (First answer about being a good student) Strengths:

- Well-structured response showing multiple aspects of being a good student
- Strong emphasis on personal growth beyond academics

Weakness: Limited personal examples  $\rightarrow$  Your answer lacks specific examples from your own experience. When you mention "staying organised" and "completing tasks on time", you could share a brief example of how you do this.

Exemplar: "I stay organised by keeping a daily planner where I track all my assignments and review my progress each evening, which helps me complete everything on time."

#2 (Second answer about unfair treatment) Strengths:

- Clear step-by-step approach to handling the situation
- Good balance between personal action and seeking help

Weakness: Vague response steps  $\rightarrow$  Your answer needs more concrete actions. The phrase "calmly assessing the situation" could be more specific about what you would actually look for or do.

Exemplar: "When I notice unfair treatment, I first observe if anyone is in immediate danger, then I might say something like 'Hey, could you please stop that?' or 'Would you like to join us instead?'"

#3 (Third answer about meeting Mozart) Strengths:

- Personal connection through musical background
- Thoughtful questions showing genuine interest

Weakness: Surface-level questioning  $\rightarrow$  Your questions about Mozart's creative process could dig deeper. The phrase "What was your process like" is too broad and misses the chance to ask about specific compositions or techniques.

Exemplar: "I would ask Mozart how he composed his Horn Concerto No. 4, as I play this piece myself, and what inspired him to write such challenging yet beautiful horn passages."

■ Your answers would benefit from more detailed examples from your own life and experiences. Try to make each answer longer by adding personal stories that show these qualities in action. When discussing being a good student, share a time when you helped a classmate. For the unfair

treatment scenario, mention a specific situation you witnessed or handled. In the Mozart answer, talk more about your own musical journey and why his compositions matter to you.

## Section 2:

#1 Being a good student goes beyond just earning high grades; it's about embracing a positive attitude toward learning and growth.
