Section 1:

Exemplar: The carpet carried not the musty scent of age, but rather an enchanting blend of exotic aromas - fresh rosemary mingled with crisp parchment, clean soap, and sweet orange, hinting at its mysterious travels through time.

Section 1:

Strengths:

Weakness: Repetitive word choice \rightarrow The word "city" appears three times in close succession, making your writing sound monotonous.

Exemplar: The vast metropolis lay beneath the world's largest cave system, eternally hidden from sunlight. This remarkable settlement, home to Earth's most ancient civilisation, preserved its heritage through strict building customs - permitting only traditional clay dwellings.

Strengths:

- Effectively shows the dangers of the city's building style
- Creates vivid imagery with the domino comparison

Weakness: Limited detail \rightarrow Your description of the huts lacks specific details about their appearance and construction.

Exemplar: From healing centres to marketplaces, the identical clay structures stood shoulder to shoulder, their mud-brick walls barely a metre apart. When structural failure struck one dwelling, the closely-packed buildings toppled like ancient playing pieces.

Strengths:

- Builds suspense effectively
- Uses sensory details to enhance the scene

Weakness: Rushed pacing \rightarrow The sequence of events moves too quickly without building enough tension.

Exemplar: In the oppressive darkness, Aiden's trembling hands found a lone candle beside the doorframe. As the lighter's flame illuminated the chamber, the horrifying sight before him tore a scream from his throat. The candle slipped from his grasp, its light extinguished with a dull thud.

Score: 41/50

Section 2:

Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph about shelters) Strengths:

- Clear main idea about helping the homeless through shelter creation

Weakness: Limited development of shelter implementation \rightarrow Your writing mentions building shelters but doesn't explore how you would actually set them up or maintain them. The phrase "create more shelters" could be expanded to include details about shelter locations, staffing, and daily operations.

Exemplar: I would establish shelters in accessible areas of our community, staffed by trained professionals who could provide not just basic necessities but also support services to help people rebuild their lives.

#2 (Conflict resolution) Strengths:

- Shows understanding of giving space during conflicts
- Demonstrates willingness to apologise

Weakness: Passive approach to conflict resolution \rightarrow Your response focuses mainly on avoiding and waiting out the conflict. When you write "keep my distance from them for at least a week," you could instead describe active steps to resolve the disagreement.

Exemplar: I would suggest having a calm discussion with my classmate to understand their perspective and work together to find a solution that makes both of us comfortable.

#3 (Teaching Harry Potter) Strengths:

- Includes interactive teaching methods
- Shows enthusiasm for the subject

Weakness: Limited learning objectives → Your teaching plan could benefit from clearer learning goals. The phrase "different group activities" needs more specific examples of what students would learn about literature through Harry Potter.

Exemplar: Through group discussions, we would analyse the themes of friendship and courage in Harry Potter, helping students understand how these themes appear in their own lives.

■ Your writing would benefit from more detailed examples and deeper exploration of your ideas. Try to think about the practical steps needed to achieve your goals, whether it's helping the

homeless or teaching a class. You could also add more personal touches to show why these topics matter to you.

Actionable task: Rewrite your paragraph about teaching Harry Potter, focusing on specific activities and what students would learn from each one.
