#1 (First paragraph introducing the excursion) Strengths:

- Clear introduction of the purpose and location
- Includes specific details about cost and distance

Weaknesses: Lack of persuasive opening \rightarrow Your opening starts with a simple statement about learning history. Exemplar: "By churning milk into butter and washing clothes using ancient tools, we will truly understand the daily challenges people faced in the past and appreciate how different their lives were from ours."

#3 (Conclusion) Strengths:

- Attempts to summarise main points
- Shows confidence in the suggestion

Weaknesses: Weak conclusion \rightarrow Your ending simply states it's a "sensible choice" without leaving a lasting impression. The phrase "these facts clearly support my suggestion" doesn't strongly convince the teacher why this excursion matters.

Exemplar: "This excursion would transform our classroom learning into an unforgettable hands-on experience that will deepen our understanding of history in ways textbooks simply cannot achieve."

Try adding more details about what makes this excursion special and different from other options. Your writing is quite short - adding examples of what students might learn from each activity would make it more convincing.
