#1 (First paragraph) Strengths:

- Your opening establishes a unique perspective as a time traveller, creating immediate interest
- Your use of "both a privilege and a necessity" effectively conveys urgency

Weaknesses: Weak hook  $\rightarrow$  Your opening line mentions "1980s students" but doesn't create a strong enough emotional connection. The time-travel concept feels disconnected from your main environmental message.

#2 (Third paragraph) Strengths:

Exemplar: "By recycling just one aluminium can, you save enough energy to power your television for three hours - now multiply that by every can in your school."

#3 (Seventh paragraph) Strengths:

- Your future perspective adds credibility to the message
- Your positive tone encourages action rather than despair

Weaknesses: Vague achievements  $\rightarrow$  Your description of 2060's improvements lacks specific details. Phrases like "cities have become greener" and "biodiversity is beginning to recover" need more concrete examples.

Exemplar: "In 2060, our cities boast vertical gardens on every building, reducing urban temperatures by 5 degrees, while native wildlife has returned to our parks in numbers not seen since the 1990s."

Consider adding real-world consequences of climate change that your audience can relate to. Your emotional appeal could be stronger by connecting environmental issues directly to your listeners' daily lives. Try expanding your solutions beyond recycling to include more varied environmental actions.
