■ Your piece has a strong foundation with its magical concept of music creating a portal. You can make your story even better by slowing down key moments to build more suspense. Try adding more details about how the saxophone player feels throughout the story. You could describe the sounds of the portal mixing with his music. Also, spend more time showing readers who the saxophone player is before the strange events begin. Your story would be stronger if you showed his normal life first, then brought in the magical elements. Additionally, you could describe the portal's appearance more clearly to help readers picture it better. Remember to use all five senses in your descriptions.

Strengths:

- Clear resolution
- Shows the bond between dog and owner

Weakness: Rushed ending \rightarrow Your ending moves too quickly and leaves many questions unanswered. The phrase "the bomb fell" needs more details about what happened in China.

Exemplar: Two days later, when news reached them about the devastating explosion in China, Jackie curled up beside his owner on the sofa, grateful that his warning had kept them safely at home.

■ Your piece has an exciting plot about a brave dog saving his owner. The story would be better if you added more details about Jackie's feelings throughout his adventure. You could write about how scared he felt when he heard the agents coming, or how his heart was pounding as he ran. Also, you could tell us more about Jackie's owner - what is their name? What do they look like? What makes them special to Jackie? Additionally, you could make the chase scene longer by adding more obstacles Jackie has to overcome. Your ending could be longer too - maybe show us how Jackie and his owner felt when they heard about what happened in China.

Score: 40/50

The Dog Who Knew Too Much: #1 Jackie the golden retriever was simply walking around when he heard someone speaking. He put his ear to the wall the sound was coming from, and listened. He heard the words 'nuclear bomb', 'China' and '2 days' [Jackie the golden retriever was trotting through his house when mysterious voices caught his attention. #1 "I long to see you again. I'm am just not complete without you. We are a set, a pair, and we don't work without one another." Strengths:

- Creates a strong emotional connection through repetition of longing
- Effectively establishes the relationship between the pair of socks

Weakness: Repetitive opening statements \rightarrow Your opening lines repeat the same idea three times. The phrases "I long to see you", "not complete without you", and "don't work without one another" all express the same feeling, making the introduction less engaging.

Exemplar: I long to see you again, my other half. Together we made the perfect pair, bringing warmth and comfort to our wearer's feet.

#2 "We once trekked over a mountain, sailed over a see, travelled under the harbour, and lost our ways." Strengths:

- Uses adventure imagery to build a shared history
- Creates movement through varied locations

Weakness: Underdeveloped adventure details \rightarrow Your adventures lack specific details that could make them more memorable. The locations mentioned are too general and don't paint a clear picture of your shared experiences.

Exemplar: We once trekked over Mount Snowdon's rocky paths, sailed across the stormy English Channel, and ventured through the dark Thames Tunnel together.

#3 "I have some many stories to share with you, some many despairing adventures that once would have been fun, with you." Strengths:

- Shows emotional depth through contrast of past and present
- Conveys genuine longing for companionship

Weakness: Unclear emotional progression \rightarrow Your writing jumps between different emotions without showing how they connect. The shift from "fun" to "despairing" needs more detail to help readers understand the sock's feelings better.

Exemplar: Each new adventure feels hollow without you here. What should be exciting moments only remind me of the joy we once shared together.

■ Your letter shows creativity in giving voice to an everyday object. The emotional journey of the lonely sock comes through clearly in your writing. To make your piece stronger, try adding more specific details about the adventures they shared. You could describe the texture of the mountain paths they walked on or the sounds of the harbour they travelled under. Also, focus on building a clearer timeline of their experiences together. When you mention their adventures, connect them to specific feelings or memories. Additionally, try to vary your sentence beginnings instead of starting many sentences with "I". You might start some sentences with action words or descriptions of places. Your writing would be even better if you showed how the sock's feelings change throughout the letter, from happy memories to sad present moments.

When you describe your mum crying, tell us how that made you feel inside. Also, you could add more details about what it's like to be invisible to everyone. Additionally, try to end your story with a proper closing that wraps up your main ideas. Your story would be better if you showed how this experience changed you as a person.

Exemplar: The other tree seemed so exciting then - tall and mysterious, promising adventure. Now I understand that leaving my loving parents for such a simple thing was foolish. Their tree had given me everything I needed to grow strong.

#3: "June, my wife, I love watching you snuggle with Jackson, I love hugging you, I love sitting down at enjoying time together." Strengths:

- Shows warm family relationships
- Includes specific loving moments

Weakness: Repetitive structure → Your writing uses "I love" three times in quick succession, making it sound less heartfelt.

Exemplar: My dear June, watching you cuddle with Jackson fills my heart with joy. Each moment we share, whether it's a warm embrace or simply sitting together, makes life beautiful.

■ Your piece has a creative concept of telling a banana's life story, which makes it unique and interesting. You could make your writing stronger by adding more details about important moments in the banana's life. For example, when you talk about bullying, you could share a specific memory that shows why the banana started being mean to others. Also, you could write more about how the banana met June and fell in love, or special moments watching Jackson grow up. Your ending is quite sudden - try building up to it more slowly to make it more touching. You could describe the banana's last thoughts or feelings as it realises what's happening. Adding these details will help readers feel more connected to your story.

You could add more details about how the wheel looks and feels when your character first sees it. The middle part where you run could show more of your thoughts and feelings during the experience. Your ending is surprising but comes too quickly - try building up to it by dropping small hints about the portal earlier in the story. Also, you could describe the other things happening in the wheel while you run, like sounds or movements. Adding these details will help readers feel like they're right there with you in the story. You might want to work on the first paragraph to make the wheel sound more special and magical from the start.

Additionally, spend more time describing the new world they enter - what specific things do they see there? What makes it different from our world? Remember to use clear connections between events to help readers follow the story easily. Focus on showing readers the story through careful descriptions rather than just telling them what happened.

Exemplar: I was walking across the road, jaywalking if I'm honest, when an odd whispering sound caught my attention - unlike anything I'd heard before. It echoed from the traffic light ahead, but something about this one seemed different.

#2: "The kaleidoscope of a traffic light spoke, and I could tell this one was the one calling to me. Each word aligned with a glow around its' edges, and this time, it was more distinct."

Strengths:

- Creative use of "kaleidoscope" to describe the light

Exemplar: The traffic light pulsed with swirling colours like a kaleidoscope, its words glowing brighter with each syllable. The edges shimmered with an eerie light as it called to me.

- Effective use of suspense
- Strong ending that leaves readers wanting more

Exemplar: Though I fought against it with all my strength, my trembling arm reached out towards the traffic light. The moment my fingers brushed its cold surface, I felt myself being pulled inward, helplessly drawn into its glowing depths.

■ Your piece shows great imagination in creating a spooky atmosphere. You could make it even better by adding more details about how the main character feels throughout the story. Try showing their fear through physical reactions like shaking hands or a racing heart. Also, you could build up the tension more slowly before the ending. You might want to describe the traffic light's appearance more clearly at the start. Additionally, you could add some background sounds or weather details to make the scene feel more real. Focus on making each moment last longer by including more of what the character sees, hears, and feels.

You might want to expand the ending to show more of the parent-child relationship. The part where they say goodnight could include some monster-specific ways of showing love.

Also, you could describe the library setting more to help readers picture where everything happens. Additionally, try to show the main character's growing worry as they

discover more odd things. You might want to add what the special book looked like or why it was the narrator's favourite. Moreover, you could write more about what happened to other people who borrowed similar books before. Your ending gives readers a good surprise, but you could make it even better by telling us if the narrator feels guilty about not stopping these books sooner.

Try writing longer descriptions of the main character's feelings when they realise they can't stop talking. You could add more scenes showing how the narration gets them into trouble. Also, think about adding conversations with other people who hear the narration. Show how different people react to hearing someone describe everything they do. Make the ending stronger by showing why the tape might not solve the problem. Your writing would be more fun to read if you added these details.

Your ending could be longer to show how the mimes feel about losing their silent battle. Try writing a new paragraph about what happens after they speak. You could also add some dialogue when they finally break their silence.
