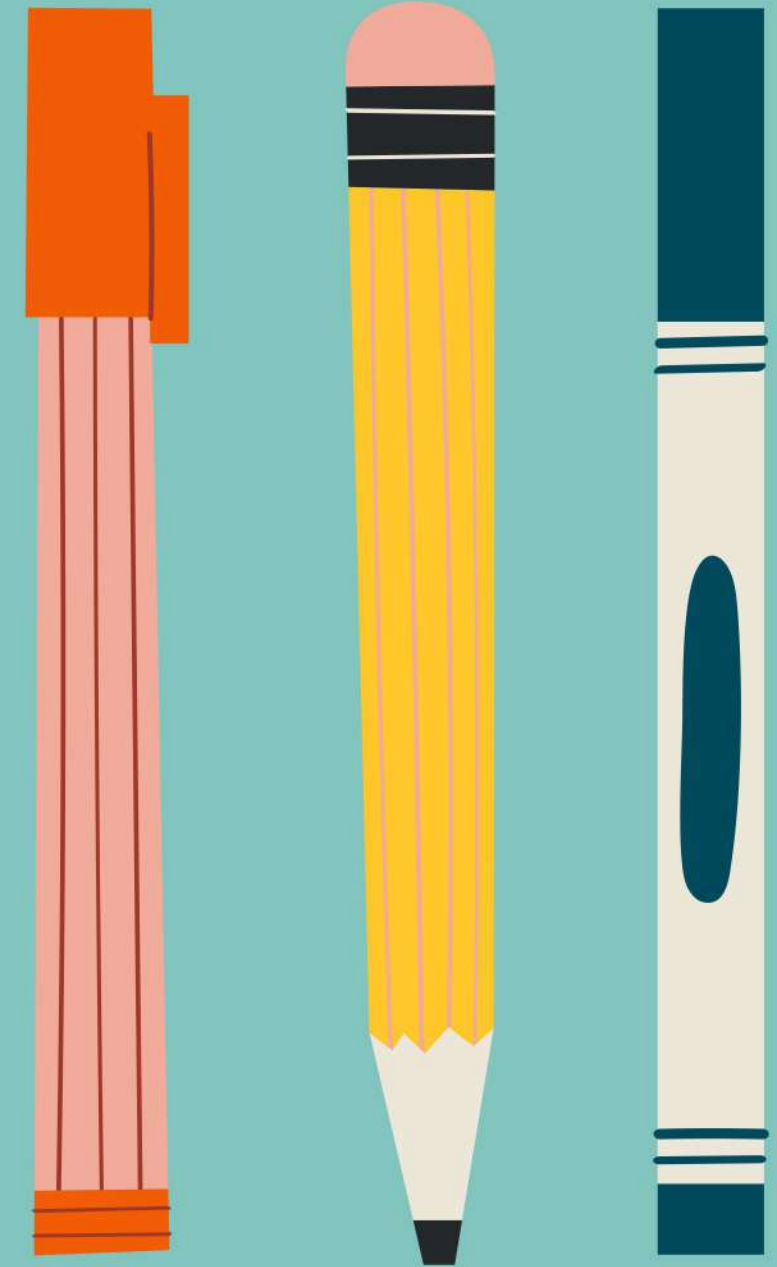

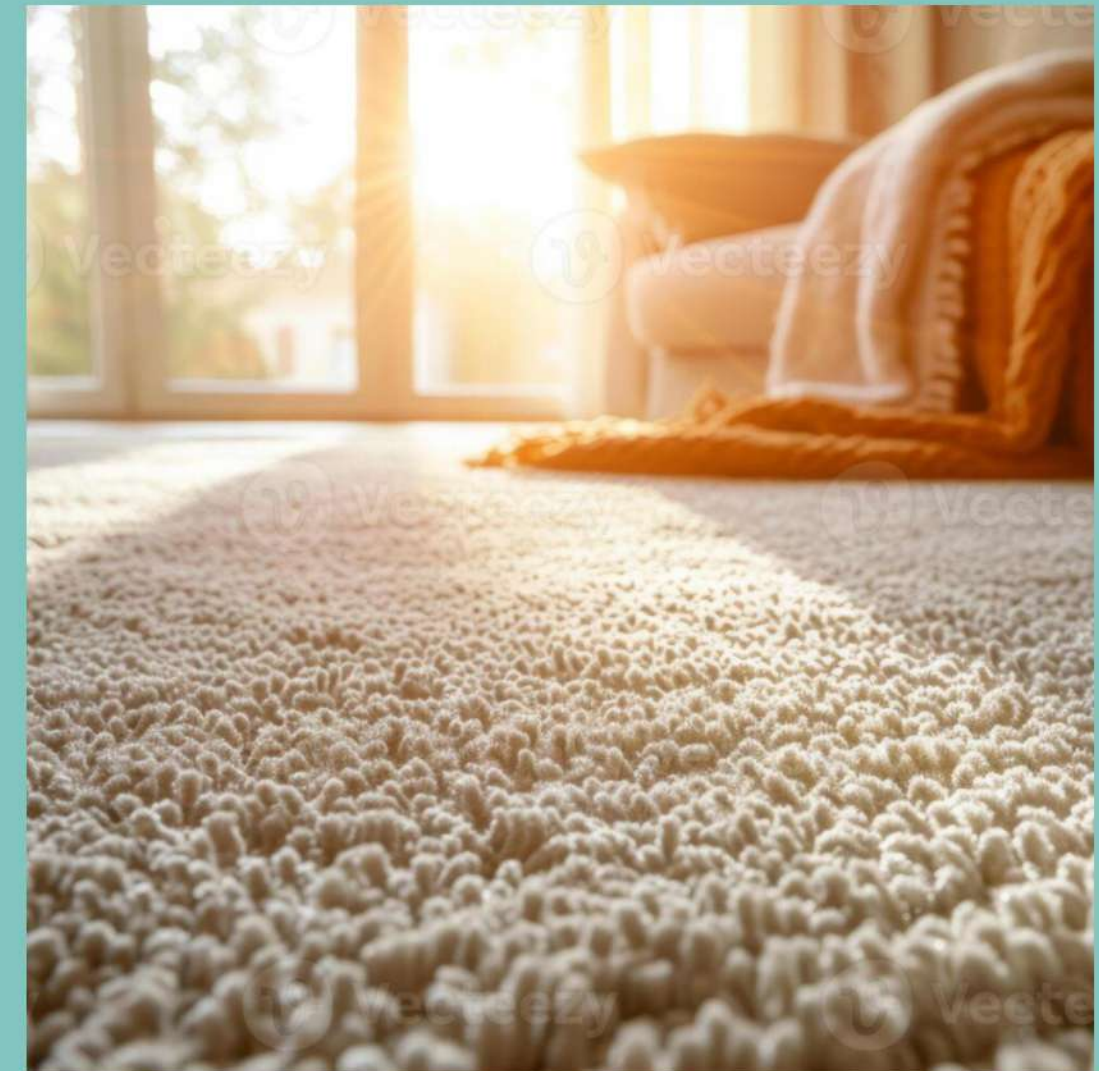


Personification and Metaphors

Personification Examples:

1. "The carpet guarded its corner of the living room, collecting fragments of daily life in its fibers like a patient observer."
2. "Each morning, the carpet greeted bare feet with its familiar texture—first coarse, then yielding."

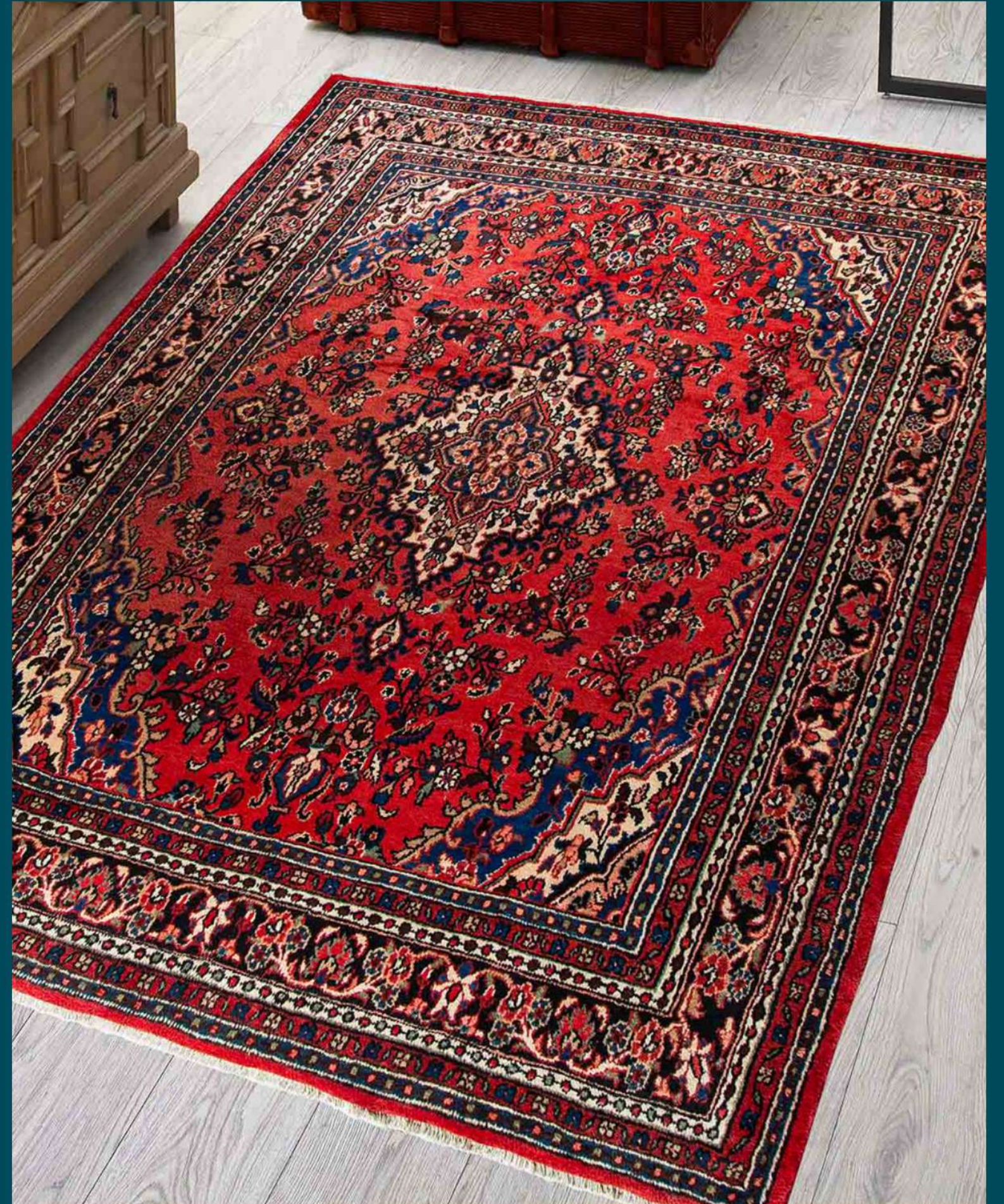
Introducing CREVASSE

2: Understanding the Elements of CREVASSE:

- **Colourful:** Use vivid and descriptive language.
- **Rich:** Add detail and emotion.
- **Engaging:** Use active verbs and interesting adjectives.
- **Vivid:** Bring the scene to life with vivid imagery.
- **Aesthetic:** Make it pleasing to the eye and ear.
- **Sensory:** Engage the reader's senses.
- **Sensitive:** Be mindful of the reader's emotions.
- **Evocative:** Evoke strong feelings or memories.

The Secrets to Narrative Writing Can Be Found in a Carpet

A carpet holds stories, textures, and emotions. By analysing it, we can unlock the secrets to powerful writing.



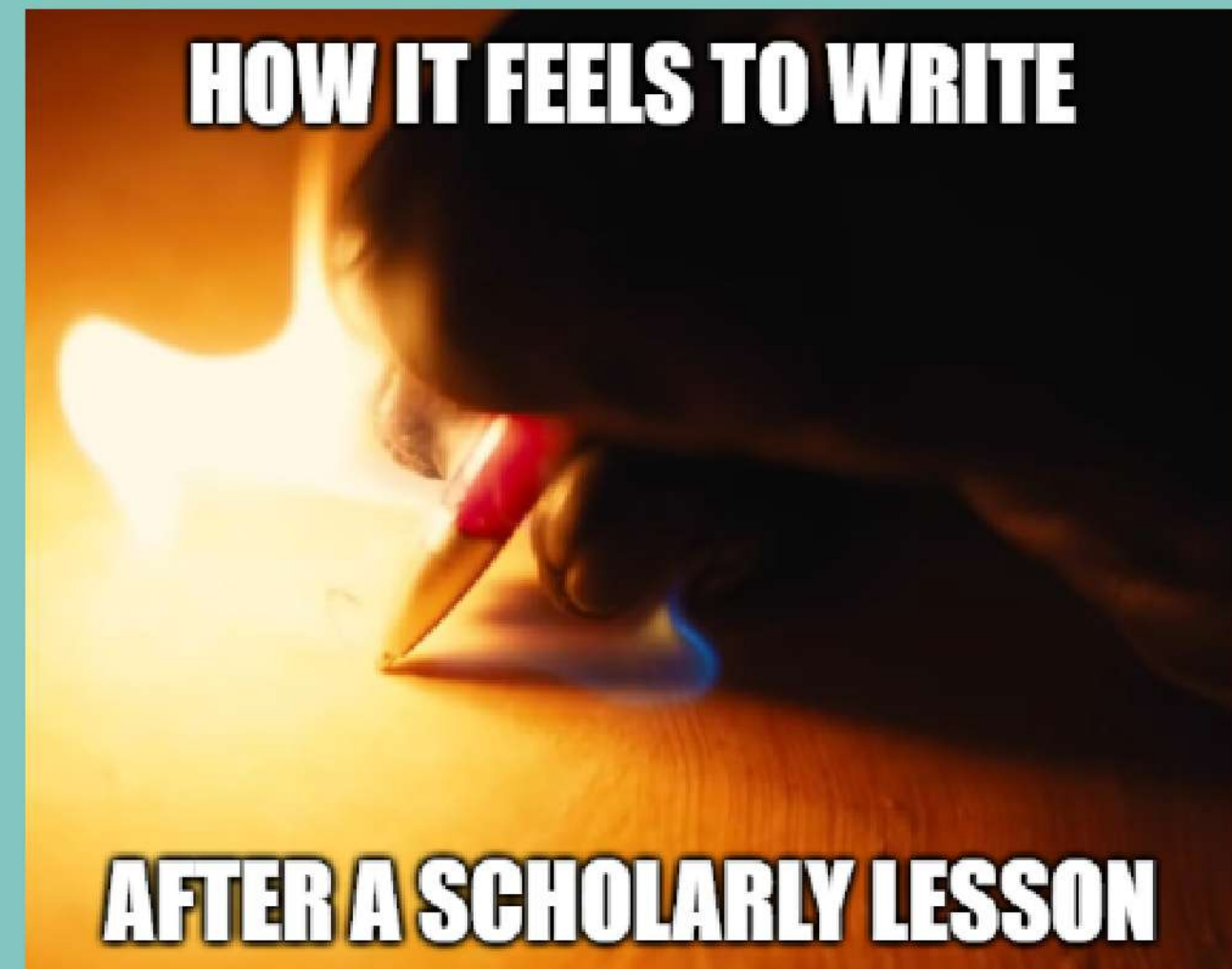
DESCRIPTIVE Formula

- **D:** Descriptive Adjective
- **E:** Noun describing the object
- **S:** Verb or phrase describing how the object looks, feels, or acts
- **C:** Adjective or phrase creating a vivid image
- **R:** Metaphor or personification bringing the object to life
- **I:** Imagination to make the sentence come alive
- **P:** Powerful language that engages the reader
- **T:** Tone that fits the subject
- **I:** Interesting details that make the sentence unique
- **V:** Vivid imagery that creates a picture in the reader's mind
- **E:** Evocative words that evoke emotion.

Exemplar Narrative – The Carpet

"The Herati carpet commanded the library's center, its repeated diamond medallions creating a measured rhythm across the wool surface. Under pendant lights, the sapphire borders framed a field of deep crimson, where time had softened the dyes to reveal subtle variations—rust here, burgundy there. The central medallion bore a patina of wear from three generations of reading chairs, while corner paths had been burnished to a gentle sheen by daily passage. Against the oak floorboards, its dense pile absorbed footfalls and collected shadows, lending the room both gravity and warmth. Even the crisp selvage edges, pristine despite their years, testified to the weaver's mastery, each knot contributing to this document of both artistry and time."

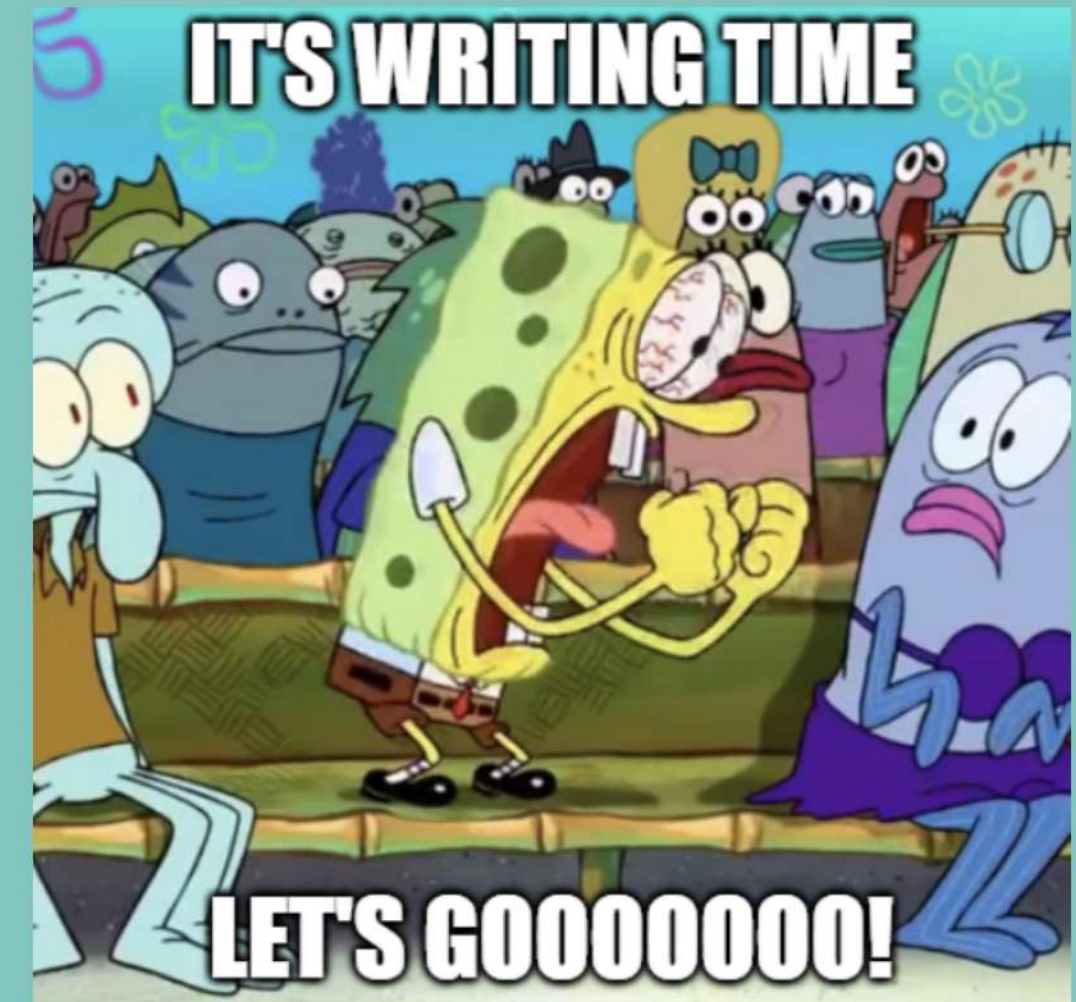

Describing a Carpet

Adapting Techniques to Other Subjects

- The techniques you've learned (CREVASSE, DESCRIPTIVE, metaphors, personification) can be applied to any subject!
- **Examples:**
 - **Grandfather Clock:** "The clock marked time in the hallway's shadows, its brass pendulum cutting golden arcs through dust-filled air."
 - **Victorian Desk:** "The rosewood desk held court in the study corner, its leather inlay crossed with the scars of a hundred letters."
 - **Garden Gate:** "The iron gate stood between two worlds, its weathered scrollwork collecting dew like precious stones each morning."

Describing a Carpet

"The Moroccan rug dominated the study with its geometric precision, each diamond motif rendered in indigo and rust against cream wool. Despite its weathered borders and sun-bleached patches, the carpet maintained its authoritative presence, defining the room's character through its measured repetition of ancient patterns."

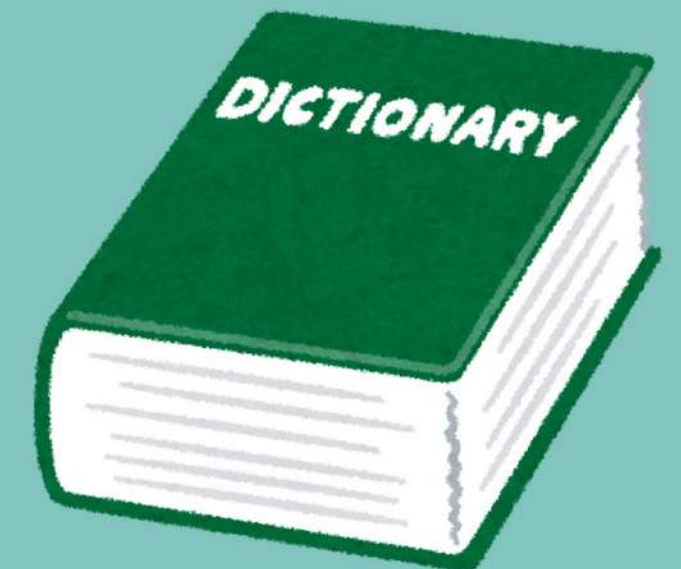

Personification and Metaphors

Metaphor Examples:

- "The carpet was a family album, recording twenty years of spilled coffee, muddy shoes, and holiday gatherings in its worn patches."
- "The carpet served as a foundation, anchoring furniture and framing conversations like punctuation marks on a page."
