


THE POWER OF CHARACTERISATION



- Characters are the heart and soul of any narrative.
- Through characterisation, you create individuals that readers connect with.
- You can craft descriptions that reveal personality, emotions, and motivations; making your characters unforgettable.

ELEMENTS OF CHARACTERISATION

• Physical Appearance: Looks, posture, and body language BOGY reactions

Outfits and Accessories: Clothing and items
that reflect personality background, or circumstances

• Internal Thoughts and Emotions: Insights into a character's mind and motivations

 Actions and Reactions: Behaviour patterns that showcase personality and development

EXEMPLARS - PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Specific- unique personality Example 1: - 'Shaahatatederofdamirosed thest Bright side of his face, pulling at his eye into a permanent glare. "Bark-like ridges formed intricate patterns across his towering frame, while moss-green growths softened his wooden shoulders. His large eyes held an innocent warmth that contrasted with his imposing height, and tiny leaves sprouted from the crevices in his broad face, swaying gently with each movement."

EXEMPLARS - PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Example 3:

"His bright blue fur caught the dim light of the pizzeria, the synthetic material showing signs of loving wear around his rotund belly and floppy ears. Behind his red bowtie, gears whirred softly as he moved his blocky head, glass eyes reflecting a perpetually cheerful expression."

BODY REACTIONS - THE LANGUAGE HOF PERCOLITY

Body reactions reveal a character's emotional CHARED.SCA state without relying on dialogue.

Techniques:

Use precise, evocative verbs to describe movements

- Show how body language shifts with emotional states
- Create contrast between outward appearance and inner feelings
- Connect physical reactions to character history and personality



EXEMPLARS - BODY REACTIONS

Example 1:

"She stood rigid among the other teenagers, her face a care MLM crafted mask of indifference. But when her sister's name echoed across the square, her halls dis OF crescents into her palas, and the D voice cracked on the First Type E PUISE of volunteering." PRESSURE OF THE ITUATION

EXEMPLARS - BODY REACTIONS

MEMORISE

Example 2:

"His large eyes grew wider at the glint of gold, bony fingers twitching involuntarily against the cave floor. Each breath became a shallow gasp, his emaciated frame trembling as he fought between crawling forward and shrinking back, throat working constantly as if trying to swallow something precious."

ADAPT



EXEMPLARS - BODY REACTIONS

Example 3:

"Her gloved hands twisted together as voices grew louder outside her door, frost creeping from beneath her feet despite her measured breathing. When someone finally knocked, she pressed herself against the far wall, shoulders hunched and fingers splayed wide as if trying to hold something back."



OUTFITS & ACCESSORIES - STYLE & PERSONALITY

A character's possessions and presentation choices reveal their story.

Techniques:

- Use clothing to reflect circumstances and background
- Include meaningful personal items that carry history
- Show how style evolves with character development
- Connect accessories to specific memories or relationships



EXEMPLARS – OUTFITS AND ACCESSORIES

Example 1:

"Tarnished rings adorned every finger, each one telling a silent story of past adventures and narrow escapes. His once-fine coat had been patched with exotic fabrics from a dozen ports, while trinkets and charms clinked softly in his salt-stiffened dreadlocks."



EXEMPLARS – OUTFITS AND ACCESSORIES

Example 2:

"His grey robes were travel-worn but dignified, their flowing sleeves marked with faint traces of ash and starlight. The gnarled wooden staff in his weathered hands seemed to pulse with a subtle inner light, while a simple silver scarf held back his untamed beard."



EXEMPLARS – OUTFITS AND ACCESSORIES

Example 3:

"Her standard-issue military tank top was sweat-stained and practical, matching the utilitarian cargo pants criss-crossed with weapon holsters. The worn combat boots and fingerless gloves spoke of countless hours of training, while a pair of dark sunglasses hung ready at her collar, hiding eyes that never stopped scanning for threats."



INTERNAL THOUGHTS AND EMOTIONS

A character's inner landscape shapes their story as much as their actions.

Techniques:

- Use sensory details to ground emotional experiences
- Show thought patterns that reveal deeper motivations
- Create contrast between internal and external reactions
- Connect present thoughts to past experiences



EXEMPLARS – INTERNAL THOUGHTS AND EMOTIONS

Example 1:

"Looking at the boy's green eyes was like being struck by lightning each time, every glance unleashing an avalanche of guilt and grief and love so ancient it had calcified into something harder than bone. He forced his face into its usual stern mask, letting old bitterness coat his tongue like armor."



EXEMPLARS - INTERNAL THOUGHTS AND EMOTIONS

Example 2:

"As he poured the tea with practiced grace, memories of shared cups with his son floated like leaves in his mind - some bitter, most sweet, all precious. The familiar scent of jasmine brought both peace and pain, each sip a reminder of wisdom earned at too high a price."



EXEMPLARS – INTERNAL THOUGHTS AND EMOTIONS

Example 3:

"The simple sight of her children twisted her heart into impossible shapes, each laugh echoing with possibilities that never were and never could be. She wrapped her arms around herself, trying to hold together the pieces of a dream that kept slipping through her fingers like smoke."



CRAFTING MULTI-DIMENSIONAL CHARACTERS

Complex characters embody natural contradictions and growth.

Techniques:


- Balance strengths with realistic weaknesses
- Show how past experiences influence present choices
- Reveal character through relationships and conflicts
- Create meaningful internal and external struggles



EXEMPLARS - MULTI-DIMENSIONAL CHARACTERS

Example 1:

"In his personal gardens, he tended to each plant with surprising gentleness, massive fingers delicately pruning leaves and testing soil with the same precision he used to reshape worlds. Yet as he nurtured life in this quiet space, the weight of his brutal calculus pressed against his mind - the paradox of a man who would destroy half of all living things to save the other half."



EXEMPLARS - MULTI-DIMENSIONAL CHARACTERS

Example 2:

"She cultivated an aura of terrifying magnificence, her horned silhouette and razor-sharp cheekbones designed to strike fear into those who crossed her path. Yet alone in the shadows with the infant princess, her stern features would soften imperceptibly, even while she pretended to despise this small human who stirred something long-buried in her heart."



EXEMPLARS - MULTI-DIMENSIONAL CHARACTERS

Example 3:

"He carried himself with a warrior's deadly grace, each calculated movement a reminder of his artificial origins and ultimate purpose as the world's most powerful weapon. Yet in quiet moments, his crimson eyes would soften at the sight of a clear blue sky, memories of a single human girl's kindness warring with his engineered instincts for vengeance and destruction."
