- a. Strengths: You're trying to show the practical benefits of having intelligent people in the community. Your writing shows creativity in imagining how smart students might contribute.
- b. Weaknesses: Vague scenarios \rightarrow Your description of "mysterious case" is too general and doesn't provide concrete examples of problems that educated people could actually solve. The informal language "take out something of their brain" and "be like ha" undermines your argument's seriousness. - c. Exemplar: Having bright young minds in our community would provide valuable resources for solving local challenges, whether helping elderly neighbours with technology problems or contributing fresh ideas to improve our community centre.
- Your letter shows good organisation with a clear introduction, body paragraphs, and conclusion. However, your arguments need more specific details to be convincing. For instance, when you mention James Ruse, try explaining exactly how that school benefits its community financially. Your writing uses too much informal language like "what on earth" and "be like ha," which doesn't suit a persuasive community letter. You could improve by using more precise examples-instead of "mysterious problems," mention actual community issues that bright students might help solve. Additionally, your repeated phrase "Therefore it is vital that we should have a selective school in our department" becomes repetitive. Try varying your concluding sentences for each paragraph. Your third point about keeping community population stable is your strongest argument, but could be strengthened with statistics about how many families currently leave the area for secondary education.
