Strengths:

You could strengthen your writing by slowing down at key emotional points and exploring Elliot's internal thoughts more deeply. Additionally, you might consider adding more specific details about the protagonist's past life to create contrast with their current existence. The dialogue between characters needs more development to feel natural and reveal character relationships. Try adding small, specific details about the storage unit—perhaps objects that trigger partial memories or emotional responses. Your ending feels somewhat abrupt; consider extending it to show how Elliot begins integrating past and present identities. Finally, the mountain scene could become more meaningful if connected more explicitly to Elliot's emotional journey.
