Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph): Strengths:

- Strong opening hook that creates an emotional connection
- Clear introduction of the main question about screen time

Additionally, your conclusion needs stronger support for why restrictions are necessary. Your opening paragraph could be less extreme while still capturing attention. Try building your argument step by step, using clear examples from children's daily lives. Focus on explaining why each point matters for children's wellbeing.

Section 2:

Technology & Screen Time: How Much is Too Much? Should kids have unlimited screen time, or should there be restrictions? Discuss the benefits and drawbacks of technology in daily life.

Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph): Strengths:

- Powerful use of storytelling to create emotional impact through the turtle's perspective
- Strong hook that immediately draws readers in

Weaknesses: Limited development of opening scenario \rightarrow Your opening paragraph quickly moves from the engaging turtle scenario to a general question without fully exploring the emotional impact. The phrase "but which side outweighs the other" feels abrupt and disconnects from your compelling opening.

Exemplar: After witnessing countless sea creatures suffer from plastic pollution, we must ask ourselves: Can we continue allowing plastic to harm innocent marine life, or is it time for change?

#2 (Second paragraph): Strengths:

- Clear presentation of plastic's benefits
- Good use of specific examples like crackers and chips

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped arguments \rightarrow Your points about plastic's advantages need more supporting details. The phrase "Many companies use plastic because of how accessible and affordable it is" would be stronger with specific examples of cost benefits.

Exemplar: Companies choose plastic packaging because it costs half as much as alternative materials, making everyday items more affordable for families.

#3 (Third paragraph): Strengths:

- Strong emotional appeal about marine life
- Clear cause-and-effect relationship explained

plastic makes products more affordable and accessible. In your third paragraph, expand on the environmental impact beyond marine life - discuss how plastic affects land animals, soil quality, and human health. Your conclusion would be stronger if you summarised your main points before stating your position. Also, consider addressing counter-arguments more thoroughly - acknowledge the economic benefits of plastic whilst explaining why environmental concerns are more important. Additionally, your piece would benefit from suggesting specific alternatives to plastic that are both practical and environmentally friendly. Your opening scenario effectively grabs attention, but try maintaining that emotional connection throughout the piece.

Section 2:

Section 1:

#1 First Body Paragraph (When children learn from school...) Strengths:

- Clear topic sentence introducing socialisation benefits
- Good use of supporting examples showing practical advantages

Weaknesses: Limited Development \rightarrow Your paragraph mentions socialisation but doesn't fully explore how specific school activities build these skills. The connection between physical teacher help and student learning needs more depth.

Exemplar: "At school, children develop crucial social skills through group projects, playground interactions, and classroom discussions, which prepare them for future workplace collaboration."

#2 Second Body Paragraph (On the other hand...) Strengths:

conclusion needs stronger reasons why school is better - think about long-term benefits for students' futures. Also, add examples of successful school programmes or activities that make learning more effective. Your transitions between paragraphs could be smoother - try linking ideas more clearly. You can improve your piece by giving more details about how teachers help students learn better in person. Additionally, explain how school routines and structure help students develop good study habits.

Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph): Strengths:

- Clear opening that introduces the topic and poses a thought-provoking question

Additionally, your middle paragraph about animal welfare could explore why some people feel strongly about animal rights. You've made good points about health impacts, but you need to explain them better - like how exactly does fat in meat affect our blood? When writing about taste preferences, you could describe different meat dishes people enjoy. Your conclusion needs to remind readers of your main points before stating your final opinion.

Section 1:

#1 (Opening paragraph) Strengths:

- Engaging narrative hook that draws readers in through a relatable scenario
- Good use of sensory details like "intense pain shot out"

Weakness: Limited development of scenario \rightarrow Your opening story feels rushed and could better build tension. The quick jump from being in first place to fourth place needs more details about the emotional journey and internal thoughts.

Exemplar: As you rounded the final bend, your heart pounding with excitement, victory seemed within reach. But suddenly, your ankle gave way, sending waves of pain through your leg. Focus on making your arguments more complete by thinking about different ways trophies might affect different types of students.
