#1 (First paragraph): Strengths:

Weaknesses: Limited development \rightarrow Your conclusion restates points without strengthening them. You list reasons but don't explain their importance or impact.

Exemplar: Mobile phones should be banned during school hours to create a fair learning environment, reduce financial pressure on families, and maintain academic honesty. By focusing on genuine learning rather than digital distractions, you can develop true understanding and skills.

■ Your persuasive piece shows promise but needs deeper development of ideas. Focus on explaining why each point matters to students, teachers and parents. Also, try linking your ideas more smoothly - when you talk about phone costs, connect it clearly to learning impact. Additionally, add more real examples of how phones affect daily school life. Your conclusion could be stronger by explaining what positive changes would happen if phones were banned. Make your arguments more convincing by showing the benefits of a phone-free school environment. Try adding specific examples of how learning improves without phone distractions. Your piece would be more powerful if you explained how removing phones helps create better focus in class.
