Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph) Strengths:

- Clear introduction of the main topic about homework
- Direct statement of your position supporting homework

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped opening \rightarrow Your opening lacks a strong hook to grab the reader's attention. Starting with "Many schools" is too general and doesn't create interest. Your first paragraph would benefit from a more engaging introduction about why homework matters to students personally.

Exemplar: "Have you ever wondered why teachers assign homework every day? While some students view it as a burden, homework plays a vital role in helping us become better learners."

#2 (Second paragraph) Strengths:

- Good use of personal experience about not doing homework
- Clear link between homework and academic performance

Weaknesses: Limited evidence development \rightarrow Your supporting points need more specific examples. When you mention "Many studies show," you don't provide any concrete examples of how homework helps. The paragraph would be stronger if you shared a specific personal story about how homework helped improve your understanding of a topic.

Exemplar: "Last term, my daily maths homework helped me master multiplication tables. After practising every evening, I improved my test scores from a C to an A."

#3 (Fourth paragraph) Strengths:

- Good point about parent involvement
- Clear explanation of how parents can help

Weaknesses: Circular reasoning \rightarrow Your argument about parents helping with homework becomes repetitive. You state that "Parents know exactly how to teach their child" but don't explain why or give examples. The paragraph needs more specific scenarios of how parent involvement through homework benefits learning.

Exemplar: "When I struggled with fractions, my mum used cooking measurements during homework time to help me understand. This hands-on approach made the concept clearer than classroom learning alone."

■ Your persuasive piece shows good basic understanding of the benefits of homework. To make your writing more convincing, you need to include more personal examples that show how homework has helped you or your classmates. Also, try starting each paragraph with a stronger topic sentence that clearly states your main point. Your conclusion could be more powerful by adding a call to action telling readers what they should do about homework. Additionally, work on making smoother connections between your ideas using words like 'furthermore' and 'consequently'. Your paragraphs would be more persuasive if you explained how homework helps in specific subjects like maths, science or English. Try adding examples of actual homework tasks that have helped students learn better.

Section 2:

Section 1:

#1 (First paragraph): Strengths:

- Strong opening with vivid imagery of the school setting
- Clear thesis statement about phone prohibition

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped hook \rightarrow Your opening scene needs more sensory details to make it more engaging. The rhetorical question "Have you ever seen a place like that?" feels rushed and doesn't fully connect with your main argument.

I walked through the school hall during lunch break yesterday. The silence was eerie - dozens of students sat hunched over their phones, their faces bathed in blue light. No laughter, no chatter, just the occasional tap of fingers on screens. This concerning sight shows why mobile phones must be prohibited at school.

#2 (Second paragraph): Strengths:

- Good use of relatable example about screen time limits
- Clear connection to school context

Weaknesses: Unclear reasoning \rightarrow Your argument about timer limitations lacks clear links between cause and effect. When you write "by the time they chime, most teens will either forget what the ringing meant," you don't fully explain why this leads to phone prohibition being necessary.

Students often ignore screen time limits, showing why simple restrictions aren't enough. When the timer rings, many continue scrolling through their phones, forming habits that harm their learning. This proves we need a complete ban on phones at school.

#3 (Fourth paragraph): Strengths:

- Addresses important issue of online safety
- Links phone use to broader social issues

Weaknesses: Rushed conclusion \rightarrow Your discussion of bullying and mental health feels hurried. The jump from "disturbing content" to bullying needs more steps to show the connection clearly.

The risks of unrestricted phone use go beyond academic concerns. When students freely access social media at school, they often encounter harmful content that affects their wellbeing. This negative exposure can lead to bullying as students react differently to what they've seen.

■ Your persuasive piece shows good potential but needs deeper development of ideas. The structure of your arguments could be stronger - try to make each point flow naturally into the next. Think about adding more real-life examples from your school to support your points. Also, your conclusion feels a bit sudden - spend more time explaining why a complete ban is better than other solutions. Your opening paragraph grabs attention but could paint an even clearer picture of the problem. Try to add more details about how phone use affects daily school life. Make your arguments stronger by showing, not just telling, why phones are harmful. Add examples of specific situations where phones have caused problems in class.

Score: 43/50

Section 2:

Paint a picture of bustling [a busy] hall, but filled with emotionless students just gazing blankly at their phones. Have you ever seen a place like that? Many people are addicted to their devices, and in this essay, I will state that [explain why] mobile phones should be prohibited at school. #1

Firstly, most schools have restrictions on when you can use your phones, but teens that [who] become easily distracted with them can instantly surpass this limit. Have your parents ever set a limit on how much screen time you could do, and almost instantly, the timer was finished, but you kept using the device anyway? This is what most teenagers at school do, with all of them doing an average of 4.8 hours of screen time every day, easily becoming a habit in their tertiary years. Even though this problem can easily be prevented by setting alarms and timers, by the time they chime, most teens will either forget what the ringing meant, or they would just press the snooze button and remind them outside their restriction. #2

To continue, mobile phones at school straight after a rigorous lesson will hinder the brain's ability to process information and strategies, resulting in decreased grades. A study shows that excessive screen time will thin the cerebral cortex, the part of the brain responsible for memory and information processing. Every day after recess, you will see otherwise gifted students sluggish after school and forgetting how to solve problems from using mobile phones too much.

Finally, the more screen time a child does at school, they will see [the more they encounter] more disturbing content, worrying them at school and making other teens question: 'Why is this person acting so weird?' thus, leading to more bullying, in the virtual and real world. Bullying is already a massive problem for every age group, and will most likely result in mental health problems. Even if students never look at social media at school, they will most likely see inappropriate ads in a website for school, leading to depression and sleep disorders. #3

As a result, it is clear that mobile phones should be prohibited at high schools. Teens can still use their laptops, but only at their teacher [teachers'] discretion. We need to address these disadvantages now, and implement a ban on phones in high schools.
