## Section 1:

Exemplar: When Sarah, a Year 5 student, had to abandon her promising piano lessons due to homework taking three hours every evening, she lost not only a potential career pathway but also a vital creative outlet that had brought her joy and confidence.

For instance, as mentioned before, less homework improves the focus of children during learning time. Many of the children do not even get to finish most of their homework. Instead of putting heavy piles of assignments on children, less workload would not make much of a difference."

Exemplar: Quality-focused homework—such as one thoughtful reading response rather than ten comprehension questions—would still allow teachers to assess pupils' understanding whilst reducing stress and increasing completion rates, as demonstrated in Ms. Wilson's Year 6 class where homework completion improved from 65% to 92% after this approach was adopted.

Your persuasive piece presents a clear position on reducing homework, but your arguments could benefit from more specific evidence. Your emotional language about talents "thrown to rot" is passionate but might be more effective with concrete examples of specific activities children miss due to homework. Also, your counterargument section acknowledges homework's traditional purpose, but you could strengthen this by explaining exactly how a reduced homework model would still allow for academic assessment. Your conclusion summarises your main points effectively, but adding a specific, actionable recommendation for an ideal amount of homework would make your argument more compelling. Try balancing emotional appeals with logical evidence throughout your writing. Your transitions between paragraphs flow naturally, helping the reader follow your reasoning.
