The word "undoubtedly" overstates your claim without sufficient backing.

The phrase "a survey indicated" lacks specificity, making your evidence seem less reliable. Additionally, you make a broad claim that homework "merely exhausts" without acknowledging potential benefits for some students.

Research by education experts has shown that for primary school pupils, increased homework assignments often don't correlate with improved academic performance. For many children, excessive homework can lead to fatigue and actually reduce their ability to concentrate during classroom learning.

■ Your persuasive piece shows enthusiasm for your position on banning homework, which is commendable. However, your argument would be more convincing if you acknowledged the opposing viewpoint more thoroughly before countering it. The third paragraph begins to do this but dismisses contrary views too quickly. You could strengthen your writing by addressing specific benefits that homework supporters claim and then explaining why these benefits don't outweigh the drawbacks you've identified. Also, your conclusion is somewhat abrupt and shifts to a call for action that feels disconnected from the rest of your piece. Try building up to this call more gradually through your paragraphs. Your emotional appeal about family connections is compelling, but you could connect it more clearly to academic success. Consider reorganising your paragraphs to build a more logical progression from one point to the next. You might start with the academic argument, move to the health impacts, then family effects, before concluding with your strongest point and call to action.
