# The Evolution of Writing Requirements

## Key Changes Over Time



### Then vs Now

10-15 years ago, coaching colleges barely offered writing courses. When available, they provided minimal feedback and little structured training.



### Increased Competition

Modern coaching has dramatically raised standards, making writing a critical differentiator in both selective and scholarship testing.

## Current Requirements



### Scholarship Writing

- ✓ Tests narrative and persuasive writing
- ✓ Must score in top 4% to receive an interview
- ✓ Requires extensive vocabulary and original ideas



### Selective School Writing

- ✓ Tests diverse text types: diary entries, emails, advertisements, etc.
- ✓ Now represents 25% of the selective test score
- ✓ Top 10 selective schools require top 10% writing performance



**Key insight:** Modern selective and scholarship writing success demands both specialised coaching and consistent practice from an early age.

# Different Text Types: Selective vs Scholarship



## Selective School Writing

Tests a diverse range of unconventional text types:

### Diary Entries

Personal reflections with emotion and sensory details

### Emails

Formal or informal communication with specific structures

### Advertisements

Persuasive techniques with visual and textual elements

### Feature Articles

Journalistic writing with facts and human interest



## Scholarship Writing

Focuses on traditional, fundamental text types:

### Narrative Writing

- ✓ Teaches character development and plot structure
- ✓ Develops descriptive skills and sensory language
- ✓ Builds fundamental creative writing abilities

### Persuasive Writing

- ✓ Develops logical argument structure and reasoning
- ✓ Integrates general knowledge and examples
- ✓ Enhances critical thinking abilities



### Important Connection:

Mastering narrative and persuasive writing (scholarship focus) builds a strong foundation for the diverse text types in selective tests. There is significant skill transfer between these text types.

# The Importance of Early Preparation

## Why Reading Isn't Enough



### The Reading Misconception

Many parents believe that if their child reads extensively, they'll naturally develop strong writing skills. However:

- ✗ Reading is often passive while writing is active creation
- ✗ Most children (80-90%) don't naturally absorb vocabulary from reading
- ✗ Children typically read at or below their current level



### A Better Analogy

"Reading improves writing, but that's like saying walking will make you an Olympic athlete. It improves your health, but won't translate to elite performance."

**What's needed:** Specialised training alongside general reading habits.

## Early Vocabulary Building



### Years 2-3: Vocabulary Focus

The foundation of excellent writing is rich vocabulary acquisition.

#### Recommended Activities:

- ✓ Vocabulary.com exercises and games
- ✓ Daily diary writing (300-400 words)
- ✓ Practise using five senses in descriptions



### Important Timing Consideration

Year 3 is the optimal time to start specialised writing coaching if aiming for scholarships or top 10 selective schools.

**Why not Year 4?** Most students focus on OC preparation during Year 4, leaving little time for writing development.

# Year 3: Critical Foundation Building

## Why Year 3 Is Crucial

### Optimal Timing

Year 3 is the ideal time to begin specialised writing training, as Year 4 will be dominated by OC test preparation, leaving little time for writing development.

"If you're aiming for a scholarship or top 10 selective school, you need to start coaching in Year 3."

### Time Management

- ✓ Dedicate one full year to writing development
- ✓ Establish consistent writing habits (daily practice)
- ✓ Balance vocabulary building with text-type practice

### Narrative Writing


- ✓ Character development
- ✓ Plot structure
- ✓ Descriptive techniques

### Persuasive Writing

- ✓ Argument structure
- ✓ Example integration
- ✓ Critical thinking

 **Key insight:** Focus on mastering narrative and persuasive writing in Year 3. These fundamental text types provide the skills needed for all other formats you'll encounter in selective exams later.

# Year 4: Balancing OC Preparation and Writing

## The Year 4 Challenge



### Time Constraints

Most of Year 4 is dominated by OC test preparation, focusing on:

- > English comprehension
- > Mathematics
- > Thinking skills

With limited study time (2-3 hours daily), writing practice is often sacrificed.



### The Post-OC Gap

After the OC test, many students:

- ✗ Take a 3-5 month break from studying
- ✗ Lose writing momentum and skills
- ✗ Fall behind in vocabulary development

"By the end of Year 4, the whole of Year 4, you've done no writing."

## Strategic Approaches



### Leveraging Comprehension Skills

OC preparation isn't entirely separate from writing development:

- ✓ Reading comprehension builds functional vocabulary
- ✓ Thinking skills enhance persuasive writing abilities
- ✓ Maintain awareness of these connections while studying



### Practical Maintenance Solutions

- 1 Schedule weekend writing sessions (even short ones)
- 2 Continue vocabulary development through games and apps
- 3 Minimise the post-OC break period (1 month maximum)
- 4 Resume intensive writing practice immediately after OC



**Key insight:** While OC preparation dominates Year 4, students seeking top selective placements or scholarships must find ways to maintain their writing development. Year 4 is a maintenance year—try not to lose the skills developed in Year 3.

# Year 5: Intensive Scholarship Preparation

## The Critical Time Window



### Scholarship Timeline

Many prestigious girls' schools conduct scholarship exams in August/September of Year 5, giving students only a 7-month preparation window.

"If you're preparing in Year 5, you have like a 7-month window to get really, really good at writing."



### Competitive Reality

The standard required for scholarship consideration is exceptionally high:

- ↑ Must score in the top 4% of all candidates
- 📅 Example: In a test of 400 students, you need to be in the top 16
- ★ Writing must stand out with unique voice and exceptional vocabulary

## Intensive Practice Strategy



### Daily Commitment

The volume of practice needed is substantial:

- ✓ Minimum 1 hour of writing practice daily
- ✓ Aim for 1-2 complete writing pieces every day
- ✓ This produces 365-730 pieces per year compared to the typical 26 pieces at standard coaching colleges



### Building a Creative Repertoire

Develop a versatile collection of elements you can mix and match on exam day:

#### Characters

Develop 10-12 unique characters with detailed backgrounds

#### Settings

Create 12-15 diverse atmospheric settings

#### Plot Templates

Master 8-10 versatile plot structures

#### Examples

Collect real-world examples for persuasive writing

“A student who won six full scholarships was writing three to four narratives a day. By the time she got to the exam, she could mix and match characters, atmospheres, and beginnings to create something original yet practiced.”

# The Reality of High-Level Competition

## The School-Coaching Gap



### Current School Standards

The average Year 5 student's writing ability is significantly below selective test requirements.

*"Most kids' writing in Year 5 is at a Year 2 level... the ordinary Australian child's writing ability is an absolute joke."*



### Teacher Capabilities

Even educational professionals often lack the specialised skills needed to train students to scholarship level.

- ✓ School writing focuses on basic competency
- ✓ Limited individualised feedback in classrooms
- ✓ Teachers rarely required to write at elite levels themselves

## Volume of Practice: Reality vs Expectation

### Standard Coaching

**1 writing piece**  
every 2 weeks

"Like seeing a personal trainer once every two weeks—how exactly are you going to gain strength?"

### Scholarship Winners

**1-4 writing pieces**  
EVERY DAY

"A student who won 6 scholarships was writing 3-4 narratives daily before exams."



### What Successful Students Actually Do

- ✓ Consistent daily practice (7-14 pieces weekly)
- ✓ Multiple specialised writing courses simultaneously
- ✓ Replace entertainment time with focused practice
- ✓ Develop a bank of interchangeable narrative elements

“Coming up with something completely original in 30 minutes is nearly impossible without training. Even renowned authors would struggle. It's like asking a classical pianist to compose a masterpiece in 20 minutes.”

### Home Practice Guidelines

- ✓ Keep a physical diary (300-400 words daily)
- ✓ Establish a consistent writing routine (same time daily)
- ✓ Use timed writing practice (25-30 minutes per piece)
- ✓ Replace entertainment time with focused writing sessions

## Creating an Effective Practice System



### Structured Approach

- 1 Alternate between narrative and persuasive writing daily
- 2 Create a catalogue of characters, settings, and plot structures
- 3 Collect real-world examples for persuasive writing topics
- 4 Review and revise previous work weekly to identify patterns



### Advanced Techniques



#### Story Remix

Rewrite the same story using different elements



#### Expanding Seeds

Develop full stories from one-sentence prompts



#### Speed Writing

Gradually reduce time limits to build efficiency



#### Mix & Match

Randomly combine different story elements

“Writing is one of those things that you're going to carry with you until university anyway, so you might as well learn it earlier. The earlier you make it a habit, the less stressful it is later on.”

# Summary and Key Takeaways



## Evolution of Competition

- ✓ Writing standards have dramatically risen over the past decade

- ➔ Create writing repositories with reusable elements
