Section 1:

#1 - "The Human Cost Of Poverty" (Introduction)

Strengths: Your introduction effectively establishes the human dimension of poverty rather than just presenting statistics. You've created a strong opening that engages the reader emotionally.

Weakness: Lack of specificity regarding the news angle. → Your piece is structured more like a general essay about poverty rather than a news article about a recent event or issue in another country. While you mention poverty as a global challenge, you haven't identified a specific recent event, location, or development that would frame this as news. For example, when you state "poverty is a harsh reality for billions," you could instead focus on a specific recent development like "Recent flooding in Bangladesh has exacerbated poverty rates, with over 2 million people newly displaced."

Exemplar: A devastating famine in Somalia, worsened by the recent drought affecting the Horn of Africa, has pushed an additional 500,000 people below the poverty line this month, reports the UN.

#2 - "Health Implications Of Poverty" (Middle section)

Strengths: Your connection between poverty and health outcomes is well articulated. The inclusion of an expert quote from Dr. Tedros adds credibility to your writing.

Weakness: Missing current news context. \rightarrow While you mention COVID-19, this section treats it as background information rather than recent news. The paragraph lacks specific details about current health implications in a particular country. For instance, when discussing the pandemic, instead of general statements, you could focus on a recent outbreak or health crisis in a specific country and its immediate impacts.

Exemplar: Last week's cholera outbreak in rural Zimbabwe has already claimed 27 lives, with local hospitals reporting severe shortages of clean water and basic medical supplies due to ongoing economic instability.

#3 - "A Call to Action" (Conclusion)

Strengths: Your conclusion effectively brings together the themes of the piece and emphasizes collective responsibility. The tone is appropriately urgent and forward-looking.

Weakness: Vague solutions without specific news references. → The conclusion offers general statements about addressing poverty without mentioning any specific recent initiatives, policies, or international responses that would be expected in a news article. For example, when you write "Governments, organizations, and individuals each have a part to play," you could instead reference specific recent actions like a UN emergency fund or an NGO's new program in response to a particular crisis.

Exemplar: Following yesterday's emergency meeting in Geneva, the World Bank has announced a £300 million relief package specifically targeting education infrastructure in flood-affected regions of Pakistan, with distribution set to begin next month.

■ Your piece demonstrates strong writing skills and a good understanding of poverty as a global issue, but it doesn't fulfill the requirements of a news article about a recent event. While your analysis of poverty's impacts is thorough, you need to anchor your writing in a specific, current event happening in an identifiable country. The writing reads more like an informative essay than breaking or recent news. To improve, you should select a specific poverty-related event that has occurred recently (within days or weeks), identify the country where it's happening, explain why this particular development matters now, and include quotes from people directly affected. Also, provide concrete details about international response efforts currently underway. Try restructuring your piece to follow the inverted pyramid style typical of news articles, with the most important and newest information at the beginning rather than building to a conclusion.
