

# Private vs Selective Schools in Australia

**Key Observations:**

- The top four selective schools (North Sydney Boys, James Ruse, Baulkham Hills, North Sydney Girls) have maintained high positions
- Some selective schools like Sydney Girls and Sydney Boys have dropped significantly in rankings
- Private schools like Sydney Grammar and Knox Grammar have dramatically improved their rankings
- In 2023, approximately 6 out of the top 10 schools were private schools, compared to just 1 in 2014
- The majority of schools ranked 11-20 are now private schools


#### English Performance



Schools make scholarship offers ranging from 25% to 100% of tuition fees. Offers can be negotiated, especially if you have multiple offers.






### Geographic Distribution of Top Schools
