


# Day 6: Advanced Persuasive Email Writing

## Review of Day 5

Yesterday, we learned about the basic structure of persuasive emails and the SCRAP framework (Situation, Consequences, Request, Action, Positive Outcome). We also explored the differences between formal and informal email tones using our playground renovation scenario.

Your school playground has been neglected for years. The equipment is rusty and outdated, the ground is uneven with exposed roots and holes, and there's no shade during hot days. As a student council representative, you need to write emails to advocate for renovations.

## Advanced Persuasive Strategies for Emails

While emails need to be concise, they can still incorporate powerful persuasive techniques:

## Audience Segmentation and Tone Adaptation

Different audiences have different priorities, concerns, and preferred communication styles. Effective persuasive writers adapt their message for each audience while maintaining their core arguments.

## Exemplar: Email to School Principal



**Subject:** Urgent Safety Hazards: Playground Renovation Critical for Student Wellbeing  
**Dear Principal Chen,**

I am writing on behalf of the Student Council regarding our playground, which has deteriorated from a once-vibrant haven of childhood joy into a **treacherous landscape of lurking dangers**. This matter requires your immediate attention. Our playground has become a **battlefield where students fight daily battles against injury**. The once-proud swing set now **stands like a wounded soldier**, its metal supports **weeping rust-colored tears** that stain children's hands and clothing. The slide, **once a gateway to exhilaration**, has transformed into a **scorching torture device** during summer months, reaching temperatures that **sear young flesh on contact**. Yesterday, I witnessed first-grader Mia Chen **recoil in agony**, tears streaming down her flushed cheeks, after her legs touched the slide's superheated surface. The ground beneath the equipment has **eroded into a treacherous moonscape** of hidden dips and exposed roots that **sneak unsuspecting feet like nature's cruel traps**. Last week alone, three students suffered injuries from falls—two **pained cries echoing across the playground** serve as a daily reminder of our collective failure to protect them. I recently observed a group of special needs students **gazing longingly from the sidelines**, their faces masks of **resigned disappointment** as they were unable to navigate the hazardous terrain that should have welcomed their participation. The statistical evidence reinforces these observations. Our school nurse reports a **67% increase in playground-related injuries** compared to last year. These aren't mere numbers—they represent **real children enduring real pain** that is entirely preventable. I understand budget constraints are significant, which is why the Student Council has researched cost-effective solutions. We've identified three community grants specifically for playground safety improvements and developed a phased renovation plan that prioritizes the most dangerous areas first. Additionally, our parent community has expressed willingness to participate in supervised working bees to reduce labor costs. Could we please schedule a meeting next week to present our detailed findings and proposed solutions? We are available any day during lunch period or after school hours. The playground should be a place where children's laughter rises freely, not where their **whimpers of pain fall on indifferent equipment**. ## Exemplar: Email to Local Council Member



**Subject:** Urgent: School Playground Safety Violations Require Council Intervention  
**Dear Councillor Johnson,**

I write to you as both a concerned student representative and a young citizen of our community regarding a matter of public safety that falls within your jurisdiction: the dangerous condition of Westfield Primary School's playground. Our playground has become a **monument to neglect**, with equipment that **violates numerous safety regulations** and creates an environment where children's safety is compromised daily. The **skeletal frames of once-functional play equipment now protrude like exposed bones**, with jagged edges and missing safety components that **mock the very safety standards** our council is tasked with enforcing. The impact on our community's children is severe and immediate. Last month, Year 3 student Jamie Wong received a **gash requiring seven stitches** when a deteriorated metal edge **sliced through his skin like a callous blade**. I personally witnessed his **small body crumpling to the ground**, his **piercing scream cutting through the playground chatter** as blood spread across his school uniform. The **metallic scent of blood** mingled with the **rusty odor of decaying equipment** created a sensory memory that continues to haunt those present. The uneven ground has created a landscape where **twisted ankles have become as common as homework assignments**. The absence of shade means that equipment surfaces **become burning hazards** during summer months, with temperatures I measured exceeding 60°C—well above the safety thresholds outlined in the Council's own recreational facility guidelines (Section 4.3.2). Of particular concern is the clear violation of the Equal Access provisions in Council Code 7.1, as our current playground presents **insurmountable barriers to children with disabilities**, effectively **building walls of exclusion** around those already facing significant challenges. Is this the message our community wishes to send to its most vulnerable young members? As our elected representative with oversight of public facilities and safety compliance, you have both the authority and responsibility to address this situation. The school administration has been receptive but cites budget limitations. Our research indicates that the Council's Community Safety Fund could be applied to this urgent need, particularly as the playground is used by community members outside school hours. We respectfully request a site inspection at your earliest convenience, followed by consideration of emergency funding allocation at the next Council meeting. The Student Council has prepared documentation of all safety violations with photographic evidence, which I can provide immediately. Our community deserves public spaces where children can thrive without fear of injury. Your leadership on this issue would demonstrate a true commitment to the safety and inclusion values that formed the cornerstone of your election campaign. ## Exemplar: Email to Parent Committee

**Subject:** Our kids deserve better: Join us to transform the dangerous playground  
**Dear Parent Committee Members,**

As a student representative who spends every day witnessing the playground dangers your children face, I'm reaching out to ask for your support in addressing an urgent safety issue that affects all our families. Our playground has become a **garden where injuries bloom more reliably than flowers**. The equipment, installed when most of your children weren't even born, has **aged like milk rather than wine**—deteriorating into a collection of **metal monsters that seem hungry for small fingers and unsuspecting knees**. Last Wednesday, I watched helplessly as Emma Chen, a kindergartener whose favorite color is purple and who dreams of being a vet, **crumpled to the ground screaming** after the swing's rusted chain **snapped like a brittle twig**. Her small body **hit the hard-packed dirt with a sickening thud** that I can still hear when I close my eyes. Perhaps most heartbreaking are the **youngest children who stand at the edges, eyes wide with longing**, too afraid to join in play. Your children should be **building memories of joy and adventure, not collecting scars and developing fear**. We need your voices and your parent power! The school administration is sympathetic but cites budget constraints. ## Exemplar: Email to Potential Corporate Sponsor

**Dear Ms. Rodriguez, Community Engagement Director at Westfield Shopping Centre,**

I am writing to propose a unique opportunity for Westfield Shopping Centre to make a lasting impact on our community while enhancing your brand's visibility and reputation for social responsibility. Our school playground—used by over 500 children daily and visible from the main road adjacent to your shopping centre—has deteriorated into a **visual symphony of neglect and danger**. **Before and After Examples**

**Wordy and Unclear:**  
"I am writing this email to bring to your attention the fact that there are many problems with our playground equipment which has not been properly maintained for a long time and has a lot of issues that are causing children to get hurt when they play on it."

**Concise and Clear:**  
"Our neglected playground equipment poses serious safety hazards, resulting in multiple student injuries this term."


**Generic Description:**  
"The playground equipment is very old and dangerous. It can hurt children when they play on it. The ground is also bad."

**Vivid, Specific Description:**  
"The swing set's chains, **corroded to the thickness of paper, groan like wounded animals** with each movement. The slide's metal surface, **scarred by summer sun**, has **branded three children** with blistering burns this month alone."




