#1 Strengths: Your introduction clearly states the purpose of persuading the principal about improving the library. You effectively use rhetorical questions to engage the reader.

#2 Strengths: You make a strong connection between reading and academic success. Your discussion about vocabulary improvement and future opportunities is compelling.

Weaknesses: Logical gaps → Your argument that parents might withdraw their children if the library isn't improved lacks supporting evidence. The statement "the school might break down" is an exaggeration that weakens your overall credibility. Phrases like "if you do not, they will leave the school" need more realistic consequences to be persuasive.

Exemplar: Improving our library is essential for student success. Research shows that regular readers develop stronger vocabulary and comprehension skills, leading to better academic outcomes across all subjects and preparing them for future opportunities.

#3 Strengths: Your description of the library as "dark" and "empty" creates a vivid image. You effectively contrast what the library currently is with what it could become.

Weaknesses: Repetitive language  $\rightarrow$  Your final paragraph repeats ideas without adding new information. Phrases like "Libraries are the key to your school" and "it is where you get your knowledge" have already been mentioned. The conclusion lacks a specific call to action for the principal.

Exemplar: I urge you, Principal Sam, to transform our library into a welcoming space with comfortable seating, engaging displays, and regular reading events that will draw students in and make reading an exciting part of our school culture.

■ Your persuasive letter shows passion for improving the school library, which is commendable. However, to make your argument more compelling, you need to organise your thoughts more clearly with a stronger structure. Consider starting with a clear problem statement, then providing specific examples of what needs improvement, and finally suggesting practical solutions. Your letter would be more persuasive if you included specific details about what

changes you want to see - such as new books, comfortable furniture, or special reading programs. Also, try to maintain a more formal tone throughout your letter. Your comparisons and metaphors need to be clearer to effectively support your main points. Additionally, be careful not to make extreme claims that might seem unrealistic to your reader. Instead, focus on reasonable benefits that will make your principal more likely to agree with your suggestions.
