Also, the format of your letter needs attention—the "Day 2" marker and shifting between emotional appeals and statistics creates confusion. The closing paragraph effectively summarises your position, but could be strengthened by connecting back to your opening points. Try to maintain a consistent, respectful tone throughout, even when expressing strong emotions. Your signature line mentioning "The department of Justice" is confusing since this wasn't established earlier in the letter.
