#1 Strengths: Your opening paragraph clearly states your purpose and uses an emotional appeal with the question "Would you want this paradise for readers gone forever?"

Weaknesses: Lack of specificity → Your opening doesn't mention which specific library is being demolished or provide enough context about the situation. The reader might be confused about which library you're referring to.

Exemplar: I am writing to express my deep concern about the planned demolition of Riverside Library on Main Street, which has been educating many disadvantaged people in our community for over 20 years.

#2 Strengths: You provide personal connection by explaining how you use the library and why it matters to your education with the HSC approaching.

Weaknesses: Limited evidence \rightarrow Your argument about business owners being "greedy" isn't supported with facts. The contrast between the library and shopping complex needs more development.

Exemplar: Our library serves over 200 students daily who, like me, rely on its quiet study spaces and resources. A shopping complex would benefit few while taking away an essential educational resource that serves our entire community.

#3 Strengths: You challenge the economic argument that opponents might make, showing you've considered different perspectives.

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped reasoning \rightarrow Your claim that shopping complexes "just give more job opportunities" but "will not help if you do not know how to do the job" needs more explanation and examples.

Exemplar: While a shopping complex might create temporary retail positions, our library creates lasting opportunity by helping people gain qualifications for higher-paying careers through free courses, computer access, and educational materials.

■ Your persuasive letter shows good passion for your cause, but needs stronger evidence and more specific details. You've made a good start by mentioning environmental concerns and challenging the economic argument, but your claims need more support. Try to include more specific facts about your library's services, how many people use it, and what specific programs would be lost. Also, your tone sometimes becomes too informal or accusatory, which might make the mayor defensive rather than sympathetic. You could improve your letter by suggesting alternatives, such as renovating the existing library or including a small library within the new development. Additionally, consider addressing what might happen to library staff and regular

visitors if this community space disappears. Your conclusion could be stronger by clearly restating what action you want the mayor to take.
