Exemplar: "A state-of-the-art library will feature advanced tools such as 3D printers and digital whiteboards, transforming how our community learns and creates together."

#3: "Ultimately, we must ask ourselves: do we continue holding on to a space that no longer meets our needs, or do we invest in a facility that will serve generations to come? I believe that choosing progress does not mean forgetting the past, it means building upon it."

Strengths: You've created a powerful closing argument with a thoughtful reflection. The rhetorical question effectively challenges the reader to consider the future.

Weaknesses: Missing call to action \rightarrow After building a strong case, you don't clearly tell the councillor what specific action you want them to take. This leaves your conclusion feeling incomplete.

Exemplar: "I strongly urge you to vote in favour of the library redevelopment at next month's council meeting and show our community that you prioritise creating learning spaces that will benefit students like me for generations to come."

■ Your persuasive letter shows impressive understanding of the issue for a Year Six student. You've structured your argument logically and addressed potential counterarguments, which strengthens your position. However, your letter would be more powerful if you included more personal connections to the issue—how does the current library's limitations affect you specifically? Also, your transitions between paragraphs could be smoother to help your ideas flow better. Try adding more emotive language to appeal to the councillor's feelings alongside the practical reasons you've provided. The opening of your letter could grab attention more effectively with a striking fact or personal story about the library. Additionally, your conclusion would benefit from a clear call to action telling the councillor exactly what you want them to do. Remember that persuasive writing needs to both inform and move the reader to take action.
