#1 Strengths: Your opening uses emotive language to help readers visualise the library as a special place. You've created a contrast between the library and the proposed supermarket.

Weaknesses: Unclear focus \rightarrow Your first paragraph jumps between several ideas without a clear structure, making it difficult for the reader to follow your main argument. Phrases like "that is not what is tolerating" and "we must try to have our library maintain full potential" are confusing. Some sentences are very long and contain multiple ideas.

Exemplar: The library isn't an abandoned place as some might think - it's a magical world where children's imaginations soar like birds in the sky. This special place provides both knowledge and a calm environment that a supermarket simply cannot replace.

#2 Strengths: You've included information about the academic benefits of libraries. You've connected libraries to academic performance, which strengthens your argument.

Weaknesses: Abrupt transitions \rightarrow Your second paragraph starts with a question but then presents information without smooth connections between ideas. The paragraph contains detailed information about the ACER study but doesn't clearly explain how this connects to your local library situation. The sentence "Libraries are the home to knowledge and literature so don't destroy our library or else the knowledge inside it will vanish in thin air" needs development.

Exemplar: Research by ACER shows that children who regularly borrow library books score 10-18% higher on reading comprehension tests than those who don't. By replacing our library with a supermarket, you would be taking away a vital resource that directly improves our educational outcomes.

#3 Strengths: You've included powerful quotes about libraries from famous people. The final paragraph has a strong emotional appeal about the importance of libraries.

Weaknesses: Inconsistent tone \rightarrow Your third paragraph begins with "The haunted building in the community never seen or used" which contradicts your earlier points about the library being valuable. The quotes are powerful but aren't clearly connected to your specific situation. You ask "are you gonna break a library down after that?" which uses casual language that doesn't match the formal tone needed for a persuasive letter.

Exemplar: Albert Einstein once said, "The only thing you have to know is the location of the library." These words from one of history's greatest minds remind us that libraries are essential for knowledge and community growth. Will you ignore such wisdom by replacing our valuable community resource with just another supermarket?

■ Your persuasive letter shows passion for libraries, which is excellent! However, your arguments would be stronger with a clearer structure. Try organising your letter into paragraphs with one main point in each. Start with your strongest argument first. Your letter mentions academic benefits but could expand on how the specific library serves your local community. Also, your letter jumps between formal and casual language - try to keep a consistent, respectful tone throughout when addressing a councillor. Your examples and quotes are good but need to connect more clearly to your main argument. Making these improvements would help Councillor Sam understand exactly why the library matters to you and other children. Finally, your conclusion could be stronger by clearly asking for what you want - keeping the library open - and suggesting what actions the councillor might take.
