#1 Strengths: Your opening effectively addresses the mayor directly and clearly states your purpose. You've included a quote from an authority figure to support your argument.

Weaknesses: Overuse of emotional language \rightarrow Your opening paragraph shifts too quickly from informative to highly emotional language, which can make your argument seem less credible. The comparison between the library and shopping complex is presented in a very biased way with phrases like "grey, colorless building" and companies that "try persuade residents to toss their money."

Exemplar: "I am writing to express my concern about the planned demolition of our local library. As Professor Amelia from MIT has noted, 'Libraries give poor people an equal chance to education as to those who are rich.' The proposed shopping complex would not provide the same educational benefits to our community."

#2 Strengths: You provide a personal connection to the issue by sharing how you use the library for studying. You also mention how the library benefits students preparing for exams.

Weaknesses: Weak evidence → Your statement "Experiments show that people that do study in libraries usually get higher marks in tests" doesn't provide specific information about these experiments. Phrases like "I desperately need" rely too heavily on emotion rather than solid reasoning.

Exemplar: "As a student preparing for my HSC exams in six months, I spend three hours daily at the library. Recent educational studies have shown that students who study in library environments achieve better academic results, which demonstrates the library's direct value to our community's educational outcomes."

#3 Strengths: You've created a vivid mental image that appeals to emotions. You've also addressed different groups that would be affected by the library's demolition.

Weaknesses: Overdramatic imagery \rightarrow Your use of phrases like "huge, ruthless wrecking ball" and "will be crying for stories" creates an overly emotional picture that may distract from your logical arguments. The paragraph relies too heavily on emotional appeals without balancing them with factual evidence.

Exemplar: "Consider what would be lost if the library were demolished: a quiet space where adults can focus on work, a place where children develop a love of reading, and a valuable resource for students to improve their education. Our library isn't just a

building—it's a place that helps shape our community's future and preserves our shared knowledge."

■ Your persuasive letter shows passion for saving the library, but could be more effective with a better balance of emotional and logical appeals. Your opening introduces the issue well, but your arguments need more specific examples of how the library benefits the community. For instance, you could mention specific programs the library runs or how many people use it each week. Your third paragraph about books going to waste is a good point, but you could make it stronger by suggesting alternatives like donating the books. Also, your fourth paragraph comparing libraries and shopping complexes needs clearer facts to support your claim about employment. Adding more specific details about your personal experiences with the library would make your letter more convincing. Try revising your conclusion to include a clear, respectful request for action from the mayor. Remember that persuasive writing works best when it respects the reader while making strong, well-supported arguments.
