The spelling errors ("genuisess," "injuanuatity") and confused phrasing make your argument less convincing. The paragraph lacks focus as it jumps between different points.

Exemplar: Many brilliant minds throughout history, including Stephen Hawking and Albert Einstein, gained their knowledge through libraries. Would you rather preserve this source of wisdom and imagination that inspires countless people, or replace it with yet another ordinary shopping centre?

#3 Strengths: Your concluding paragraph effectively summarizes your main arguments about the library's importance. You emphasize the timeless value of libraries for people of all ages.

Weaknesses: Repetitive phrasing  $\rightarrow$  Your conclusion repeats phrases like "imagination" and "creativity" without adding new information. The sentence "This structure is a source of creativity and knowledge that can lead to unimaginable amounts of imagination and information" is circular and doesn't strengthen your argument. The sign-off "Bye someone/ yusuf khan" undermines the formality of your letter.

Exemplar: In conclusion, our library serves not only as a functional space but as a historical landmark and a centre for community learning. It benefits people of all ages, from toddlers discovering picture books to seniors researching family histories.

You could improve by carefully proofreading your work or asking someone else to check it. Additionally, your comparisons between the library and mall need more specific examples of how the library benefits the community. You might mention specific library programs, resources, or services that would be lost. Your letter would also be stronger with a more formal tone throughout, including a proper greeting and sign-off. Finally, try to vary your sentence structure to make your writing more engaging.
