These concrete community benefits cannot be replaced by retail shops.

■ Your persuasive letter shows strong passion but needs more focus on specific, practical concerns that councillors would find compelling. You've created vivid imagery, but sometimes your language becomes too emotional or abstract. Try to balance emotional appeals with concrete examples of how the library benefits different community members. Also, your letter would be stronger if you suggested alternatives, such as renovating the existing building or incorporating a modern library into any new development. You could improve the effectiveness by mentioning specific library programs that benefit the community. Additionally, consider including a clear, direct request in your conclusion rather than rhetorical questions. Your writing shows strong creative skills, but to persuade councillors, you need to help them see practical solutions, not just express disappointment.
