

Section 1:

#1 Strengths: Your opening paragraph effectively grabs attention with rhetorical questions. You establish an urgent tone about climate change.

Weaknesses: Unclear focus → Your first paragraph jumps between several ideas without developing them fully. For example, you mention "each 'solution' is helping the enemy" but don't explain which solutions or how they're problematic. Phrases like "a planet for no one to live in" and "life is like you being on the edge of the cliff" create alarm but need more specific details to be convincing. ***Climate change threatens our future. Scientists predict that if we continue polluting at current rates, sea levels could rise by one metre by 2100, flooding coastal cities where millions live.***

#2 Strengths: You identify pollution as a major cause of climate change. You address a specific audience (Matt Kean) which gives your writing purpose.

Weaknesses: Confusing structure → Your paragraph contains several disconnected thoughts that make it difficult to follow your argument. The sentence "Then there is also fuel that comes from the earth's soil another way to pollute but, you think the car problem is solved with electricity and where does it come from oil and now you saying it is better for the environment, seriously" is too long and confusing. ***Pollution from cars and factories releases harmful gases into our atmosphere. While electric vehicles seem like a solution, we must consider where that electricity comes from. Many power plants still burn coal and oil, continuing the cycle of pollution.***

#3 Strengths: You provide some specific impacts of climate change on both humans and animals. You mention the "Black Summer" in Australia which makes your writing relevant locally.

Weaknesses: Inaccurate information → Your statement that "approximately 3.3 to 3.6 billion people" have lost their lives to climate change is incorrect. This would be about half of the world's population. The paragraph also introduces "Malira" (possibly meaning malaria) without clear connection to your main points. ***Climate change has already caused devastating impacts. During Australia's 2019-2020 Black Summer bushfires, nearly 3 billion animals were killed or displaced, and many people lost their homes. If temperatures continue to rise, diseases like malaria could spread to new areas, affecting millions more people.***

■ Your persuasive piece shows passion for the important topic of climate change. To make your writing more convincing, you need to organise your ideas more clearly with a strong central argument in each paragraph. Try to stay focused on one main point per paragraph. Also, your writing would benefit from more specific examples of climate change impacts or solutions. For instance, instead of just saying pollution causes climate change, explain exactly how greenhouse gases trap heat in the atmosphere. Additionally, check your facts carefully, as some

of your numbers seem incorrect. You could also make your conclusion stronger by suggesting specific actions readers can take, such as reducing plastic use or supporting renewable energy. Remember to use punctuation correctly to make your ideas clearer. When you edit your work, read it aloud to catch run-on sentences that might confuse your readers.
