This moment of personal connection could be leveraged more effectively.

Exemplar: "Standing there among the bleached corals, I felt not just disappointment but responsibility. If this iconic wonder could change so dramatically in my lifetime, what would be left for future generations unless we take action now?"

#3 Strengths: Your counterargument about snowy terrains shows thoughtful consideration of opposing viewpoints. You effectively address and refute a common argument against climate action.

Weaknesses: Unsubstantiated claims \rightarrow You make several claims without supporting evidence, such as "lots of land would probably have already submerged" and "we could also change the icy terrains into pieces of warm, sunny land with technology." These statements need more explanation to be convincing.

Exemplar: "While some might argue that melting ice could create new habitable land, this benefit would be far outweighed by the coastal cities and islands that would be lost to rising sea levels, displacing millions of people from their homes."

Your call to action in the final paragraph offers good suggestions, but you could make them more impactful by connecting them directly to the problems you described earlier. Also, consider strengthening your transitions between paragraphs to help your readers follow your thinking more easily. Your conclusion could be more memorable by returning to your powerful opening imagery, showing how our actions today can prevent that frightening future you described.
