#1 Strengths: You've effectively introduced the problem with vivid imagery. Your description of the playground as a "desert where there are 'spiky cactuses'" creates a strong visual impact.

Weaknesses: Inconsistent tone \rightarrow Your tone shifts between formal and casual, which weakens your persuasive appeal. Phrases like "plummeting in condition" followed by "spiky cactuses" and comparing the playground to "another moon" create an uneven voice that diminishes your credibility.

Exemplar: I am writing to express my serious concerns about the deteriorating condition of our school playground, which has become unsafe and unsuitable for student use.

#2 Strengths: You've organized your concerns into clear categories (safety, mental problems, drain problems), which helps the reader understand the scope of the issue.

Weaknesses: Unclear and exaggerated statements \rightarrow Your descriptions include several exaggerated claims that lack specific details. Phrases like "WWII Nazi Landmine zone" and "porcupine farm" are too extreme and may cause the principal to dismiss your concerns rather than take them seriously.

Exemplar: The unsafe playground conditions are affecting students' wellbeing, as many children feel anxious about playing in an area with numerous hazards and poorly maintained equipment.

#3 Strengths: You've included a clear list of requests, which shows you've thought about solutions to the problem.

Weaknesses: Underdeveloped conclusion \rightarrow Your conclusion jumps between different ideas without reinforcing your main points. The statement about "windows" seems disconnected from your earlier arguments, and ending with a request to talk privately doesn't emphasize the urgency of addressing the playground issues.

Exemplar: I respectfully request that you consider these improvements to ensure our playground becomes a safe and enjoyable space where students can relax and socialize during breaks.

■ Your persuasive piece has a clear purpose, but it needs more focused development. Your descriptions are creative but sometimes too extreme, which might make your audience less likely to take your concerns seriously. Try to use more specific examples that show the real impact of the playground problems. For instance, instead of saying "spiky cactuses," describe the actual hazards like "broken equipment with sharp edges." Also, maintain a respectful tone throughout your letter. Remember that you're trying to convince Principal Yap to help, so being

polite and factual will be more effective than using dramatic comparisons. Your requests are good, but connect them more clearly to the problems you've described. Finally, end with a strong conclusion that reinforces why fixing the playground matters to all students.
