Section 1:

#1 Strengths:

- Your opening effectively establishes the contrast between past and present conditions of Shambe.
- You use vivid imagery with phrases like "trees dancing, flowers blooming" to create a nostalgic picture.

Weakness: Underdeveloped narrative context \rightarrow Your introduction lacks specific details about how or when this environmental decline happened. Phrases like "complete rubbish filled vicinity" and "diamond suburb" would benefit from more concrete examples or a timeline of degradation.

#2 Strengths:

- You've included an expert voice (Dr. Fred Godfrey) which adds credibility to your argument.

#3 Strengths:

- Your conclusion attempts to inspire action with encouraging language.

Weakness: Structural incoherence \rightarrow The final paragraph contains fragmented thoughts with abrupt transitions. Phrases like "Without anymore saying" and the sudden call to action feel disconnected from the previous paragraph's sophisticated tone.

Let's reclaim our suburb's beauty together. By organising monthly community clean-ups, supporting local council initiatives for more public bins, and educating our younger residents about proper waste disposal, we can transform Shambe back into the thriving community we all deserve.

■ Your piece presents a passionate argument about the littering problem in Shambe, but needs more balanced development throughout. The middle section shows promising analysis but requires more concrete statistics to support your claims. You could strengthen your writing by maintaining a consistent tone—your vocabulary and sentence structure vary dramatically between paragraphs. Also, consider including more specific examples of how littering affects daily life in Shambe. Adding details about local wildlife impacted by pollution or describing a specific park or street before and after would make your argument more compelling. You might also benefit from including voices of community members alongside expert opinions. Additionally, outlining specific solutions rather than general calls for action would give readers clear steps to follow.
